Work of Minnesota Chip- pewas Big Feature at State Fair.

Agricultural and School Work Show Great
Progress of Red Men in Minnesota.

Never has the Agricultural building at the Minnesota State Fair presented such a number and variety of exhibits as were on display at the opening of the big exposition last Saturday. Prominent among these exhibits are the three booths displaying bead work, handicraft, agricultural and school work of Minnesota Chippewas.

In the first booth a variety of mats, saddle blankets, costumes, rugs and beadwork in various forms, are displayed.

The agricultural display is in the second booth. Although the fair comes at a time when the products of northern Minnesota are not fully developed, there is an excellent exhibit of farm products. George W. Cross, superintendent and special disbursing agent at the Red Lake Indian school, who is in charge of the exhibit, says the display of farm products is the best the Indians have ever sent to the fair.

Exhibits of school work of Indians are shown in the third booth. There are samples of penmanship, drawings and needlework.

John Smith, the famous 130-year-old Indian from Cass Lake, is making the Indian exhibit booth his headquarters during the fair.

Two Indian girls, Josephine Jourdan and Nellie Strong, and Mr. William Daly, arranged the exhibit under the direction of Mr. Cross.

Valuable Indian Relic.

Tyndall, S. D.--What without doubt is one of the finest and most valuable saddles in the state or Northwest has been presented to Miss Anna Kirk of this city by an old Indian friend. The saddle is entirely covered with beads, red, white and blue, fashioned in different Indian designs.

The saddle shows wear and evidently had been in use in the tribe for some years. The work on it indicates that many months and perhaps years were required to make the saddle and fashion the beadwork designs upon it.

Mrs. Kirk refused an offer of \$150 for the saddle, which is thought to be one of the finest examples of Indian work in existence.—Ex.

Chief Mesha-ke-ge-shig Passes Away.

Chief Mesha ke ge shig, one of the oldest and respected members of this reservation, died at the Old Folks' Home at Beaulieu last Thursday night. His death was due to infirmities accompanying extreme old age, he being nearly 100 years old. Mesha ke ge shig was born on the banks of the Mississippi river near where the town of Brainerd now stands, but since the settlement of White Earth reservation some fifty years ago, he has resided thereon, and for a number of years has resided on his farm near Beaulieu. His aged wife died about 5 years ago.

Deceased was a devout member of the Episcopal church, from which the funeral was held last Saturday. Interment took place in the cemetery at Beaulieu.

Annual Indian Fair to be Better Than Ever.

Superintendent G. W. Cross Lending Every
Aid Toward Success of Unique
Event.

Red Lake Indian reservation will hold its annual fair this month, September 15, 16 and 17, and arrangements are being made for putting on one of the best in the annals of the reservation, which will be a feat worth performing. G. W. Cross, superintendent at Red Lake reservation, is backing the fair and in this he is receiving the hearty co-operation of the promoters.

Besides the splendid exhibits and displays to be seen, there will be a program of entertainment, consisting of baseball and lacrosse games, in which the Indians will take part; horse races, foot races, dances by the Indians.

The reservation people are among the best agriculturalists in Beltrami county and will show displays of their splendid crops and produce. They will also have showings of cattle and other lines of stock, also poultry. The domestic science display is always a feature of the fair and this year it promises to eclipse all former showings. There will also be a big display of canned goods, and the beaded work done by such as only the Indian women can fashion will be plentifully displayed, and always in strong demand.

The "Chippewa," the Red Lake passenger boat, with a capacity of 100, will meet the Red Lake special train at Redby and convey fair passengers to the agency fair grounds.

Great preparations are to be made for "Bemidji Day," September 16. This day is always made the most of and is the "big day" of the fair when the special train is run from Bemidji.
