The Democratic convention of the First Congressional district, which was held at Owatonna on Wednesday of last week, nominated Hon. H. R. Wells, of Preston, Fillmore county, as the candidate for Representative.

The result of next Tuesday' election in the State of Maine is looked forward to with considerable anxiety by both parties, but the indications are that the Republicans will carry the State by a good round majority. Senator Blaine predicts 7,000.

The Mankato Free Press, under the new managers, seems to lean considerably towards Dunnell as a Congressional candidate from the first district. While under Gen-Baker's control it was one of the most enthusiastic supporters of Ward.

The farmers of Decoria, Blue Earth county, have formed a protective society, for the purpose of protecting themselves against thieving, but more especially horse stealing. Such societies ought to be formed in every community; if this were done there would be fewer horses stolen than there are at present.

Mr. Poehler published a letter some time ago declining a re-nomination to Congress, because his business required his attention at home.
