NOW MADE SIMPLE

Oxy-Acetylene Gas Gener-  
ates Enough Heat to Cut  
or Melt any Material.

## DEMONSTRATION SATURDAY

Process Rapidly Becoming  
Popular—Introduced Here  
Year and a Half Ago.

The working of aluminum, brass,  
copper and steel, a process that has  
taxed the inventive powers of man for  
ages, has become as simple a matter  
as the moulding of clay is to a child.  
A mixture of one and a half parts of  
oxygen with one part of acetylene,  
when lighted, makes a flame that gen-  
erates a heat about 6,200 degrees  
Fahrenheit. Under its fiery influence,  
almost any known metal may be cut,  
melted or worked. A special form of  
burner is used, called the oxy-acetylene  
blowpipe, the purpose of which is to  
mix the gases in the proper ratio.

A demonstration was given by the  
Henderson-Willis Cuting and Welding  
company of St. Louis in the Engineer-  
ing Building Saturday night. G. L.  
Walker, the demonstrator, has worked  
a year and a half at the process. He  
said he was not affected by the in-  
tense heat except that he perspired  
freely. His is an exceptional case,  
however, as most of the workers have  
to wear black glasses, and have to  
take some means to protect their  
faces. Mr. Walker said that this was  
due to the fact that many beginners  
watched the flame. He said he had  
learned to look at the metal he was  
working and was therefore not af-  
fected. The process was introduced  
into this country only a year and a  
half ago, but is rapidly becoming  
popular in all branches of metal work-  
ing industries, owing to the ease with  
which it may be manipulated, its  
cheapness and its efficiency.

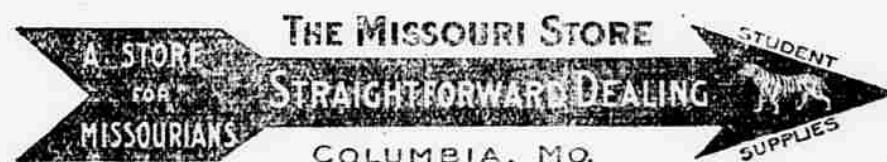
