CITY COUNCIL.**Journal of Proceedings.**

Regular Semi-monthly Meeting.
Monday evening, Oct. 16, 1911.
The council convened in regular session, Hon. F. A. Kage, Mayor, presiding, with the following members present:

Messrs. Coerver, Haas, Medley, Moeder, Morrison and Wittmor.

Absent: Messrs. Flentge and Wilson.

The record of the proceedings of the last regular meeting was read and motion of Mr. Morrison approved.

Mr. H. B. Barry, district engineer of the "Frisco" railroad, appeared before the council and permission having been granted, presented a plat showing the location of four (4) chutes in the levee, to be made when the levee is rebuilt by said railroad company, as provided under condition No. 17, of ordinance No. 935, approved January 5th, 1911; said location and number of chutes having been agreed upon between the said engineer and the mayor and council as a committee of the whole, on October 3rd last.

On Motion of Mr. Morrison, said plat was received, approved and ordered filed.

Mr. Barry also presented the following communication, which was read to the Hon. Mayor and Council:

Cape Girardeau, Mo.

Gentlemen: In behalf of the St. Louis and San Francisco R. R. Co., I respectfully request permission to extend what is known as our "East Planter's Mill Spur" for a distance of one hundred and twenty feet northward from its present end.

This extension being requested solely for the purpose of handling material for our work covered by ordinance No. 935, now under construction. This extension of track will not interfere with the traffic on Water or Independence streets, and will be removed before the completion of our paving of Water street.

On behalf of the St. L. & S. F. R. R. Co., I also respectfully request permission to lay an 8 inch vitrified tile near the west curb line of Aquamis street from a point about 150 feet north of the north line of William street to connect into the large sewer on Merriweather street. This tile being for the purpose of taking care of the seep water drainage as explained to your Honorable body this date.

On motion of Mr. Morrison, said communication was received and the prayer of petitioner granted, conditioned however that the work sought to be done be under the supervision of the Street and Wharf Committee.

Petition of resident property owners and tax payers fronting on and adjacent to the intersection of Pacific street and Jefferson Avenue, praying the council to establish a suitable light at said intersection, was read and on motion of Mr. Morrison, received and referred to the water and light committee with instructions to investigate and make report on the prayer of petitioners together with their recommendation in the premises.

Mr. Coerver submitted to the council for its action in the matter, several communications, addressed to him as president pro tem of the council, quoting prices for engineer's surveying instruments, explaining in reference to his action in asking for

said quotations, that the city engineer had no instruments of his own and was unable to secure the loan of any from anyone for completing improvements now in progress, he therefore had taken this method of getting the sense of the council, whether or not the city should purchase instruments for the use of the engineering department of the city.

Mr. Morrison moved that the city purchase an engineer's transit and an engineer's level.

The vote on said motion being unsatisfactory, the roll was called, the vote resulting as follows:

Ayes: Coerver, Moeder, Morrison, 3.

Nays: Haas, Medley, Wittmor, 3.

The Mayor declared said motion lost.

An ordinance entitled "an ordinance appropriating money to build addition to city jail and authorizing the contract made," read twice at meeting of October 2nd, last, and referred to the city treasurer for his endorsement as to sufficiency of funds to meet said contract, was again presented with the treasurer's endorsement thereon to the effect that a sufficient amount remains unappropriated in the general revenue fund applicable to the payment of said contract.

On motion of Mr. Morrison, said ordinance was read for the third time, its final reading.

Mr. Morrison moved that said ordinance be adopted and passed.

Said motion carried and the roll called on the passage of said ordinance, the vote resulting as follows:

Ayes:—Coerver, Haas, Medley, Moeder, Morrison, Wittmor, 6.

Nays:—None.

Absent: Flentge, Wilson, 2.

The Mayor declared said ordinance duly passed, and signed same as to its passage and approval, as president of the council and Mayor respectively.

Said ordinance is numbered 993 and filed.

Concerning petition of property owners on North Benton street, to open said part of Benton street for public use, referred to the street and wharf committee at last meeting for investigation and report, Mr. Coerver, chairman, on behalf of said committee, reported verbally that said committee was unable to make a satisfactory report at this time, for the reason that a majority of the property owners on said street had not signified their willingness to sign a petition to the council for the opening of said part of Benton street.

There being no objection, said committee was granted further time in which to get a further expression from the property owners favorable to the opening of said street, and make report thereon.

Mr. Coerver, chairman of the street and wharf committee, called the attention of the council to the fact, that in making specifications for the improvement of William street, between Sprigg and Water streets, no provision was made for taking care of the water at the several crossings on said Williams street or for changing or lowering the water main or flush tank on said street. The sewer pipe would be needed and work done, that is absolutely necessary while said street is under construction.

On motion of Mr. Morrison, the street and wharf committee were given authority to incur the expense of providing for taking care of the water and other necessary expenses, for which the city would be liable.

The marshal reported to the council that Lottie Lambert still held possession of the building at the corner of Lorimier and William streets.

On motion of Mr. Morrison, the marshal was instructed to notify Lottie Lambert to vacate said premises as soon as possible.

The following resolution was presented by Mr. Morrison and read:

Resolved, that the sidewalks hereafter to be constructed along William street between Sprigg and Water streets, be of such uniform line and width as shall be determined by the street and wharf committee, after thoroughly investigating the matter and determining for the best interest of the city.

On motion of Mr. Medley, said resolution was adopted.

On motion of Mr. Morrison the council then adjourned.

Ordinance No. 993.

An Ordinance Appropriating Money to Build Addition to City Jail and Authorizing the Contract Made.

Section 1. That there shall be and is hereby appropriated and set apart the sum of two

Friday and Saturday, October 26, 27 and 28, 1911.

Dr. John Paul Good, from the university of Chicago, is on the program for two addresses. One Thursday night and the other Friday morning. His subject for the first address will be, "The Rise of the Conservation Movement in America"; for the second, "The Conservation of Human Life".

Dr. John W. Redway, American representative of the Royal Geographical Society, will give on Friday night a stereoptican lecture on "Volcanoes". Saturday morning he will address the teachers, using for his subject, "Some Historical Relations in Geography".

Dr. W. W. Charters, of the University of Missouri, will deliver an address before the association Saturday. Other strong features of the program will be an address by Mr. Dearin, president of the Cape Girardeau Normal School; also an address or paper by Supt. Reavis, of the Cape Girardeau city schools.

Each of the departments will have a program in which questions of vital interest will be treated by the leading educators of the Southeast Missouri District.

It is expected that 500 teachers will attend this meeting, and the citizens of Farmington are preparing to take care of that many. St. Francois and adjoining counties are dispens-

ing with the annual fall associations. All teachers of these counties are expected to meet at Farmington for one grand educational rally.

The programs of the general sessions will be supplemented with music, vocal and instrumental, furnished by Farmington talent.

After the lecture on Friday night the teachers of the Farmington public schools and colleges will give an informal reception to the visiting teachers.

Free Transportation of Pupils.

Whenever the board of directors of any school district or board of education of a consolidated district shall deem it advisable, or when they shall be requested by a petition of ten taxpayers of such district, to provide for the free transportation to and from school, at the expense of the district, of pupils living more than one-half mile from the school house, for the whole or for part of the school year, said board of directors, or board of education shall submit to the qualified voters of such school district, who are taxpayers in such district, at an annual meeting or a special meeting, called and held for that purpose, the question of providing such transportation for the pupils of such district.
