concerned.



Mansfield C. of C. Meeting

It was a live and enthusiastic
bunch of boosters who met at
the Nugget Theatre last Tues-
day night, at the regular meet-
ing of the Mansfield Chamber of
Commerce.

The regular routine of busi-
ness was taken care of, after
which several business matters
were taken up and discussed in
regular order. The tomato fac-
tory was the first proposition to
dispose of. It seemed that ev-
ery one was enthusiastic for the
factory and something between
50 and 75 acres were pledged by
the farmers. The consensus of
opinion was at this meeting,
that it would be easy for Mr.
Greer to raise at least 150 or 200
acres for the tomato factory
next year. We don't think there
is any question but that the fac-
tory in Mansfield will run next
year, and that with a larger ca-
pacity and a bigger acreage.

There was a few acres of
grapes pledged, but this feature
will be worked out more thor-
oughly within the next few days.

Mr. Moriatt, who was to have
been with us to take up the mat-
ter of a cheese factory, sent a
letter to the president of the
club, stating that he was making
up 4 or 5 other cheese factory
projects in the Ozarks, and that
it was a physical impossibility to
be in our city at this meeting.
However he assured us that he
will be here at not a distant fu-
ture date and would be ready to
talk business to our people.

We consider this is one of the
best opportunities Mansfield
has had in some years, and we
feel certain that the people are
going to get onto it.

A resolution was passed by
the Mansfield Chamber of Com-
merce pledging aid and assist-
ance in whatever undertaking
the American Legion might un-
dertake in behalf of Clarence
King Post No. 128, Mansfield.

The meeting was closed by
someshort but enthusiastic talks,
a membership drive and plans
for the big banquet. The ban-
quet will be held Tuesday night,
Dec. 5th, at the O. T. Cafe, and
if the enthusiasm of this meet-
ing is a criterion to measure
from, there will be many more
than a hundred participate in
the feast, which will be held
in connection with the next reg-
ular meeting of the Chamber of
Commerce. If you have not al-
