Ozark Farmers to Set Out 100,000 Grape Vines.

Mansfield, Mo., Nov. 23.—The Chamber of Commerce of Mansfield is backing a movement for the planting of a large acreage of grapes, tomatoes and strawberries in this vicinity, and a shipment of 100,000 grape vines for setting out in Wright, Webster and Douglas counties is expected to arrive soon. The farmers here realize that the growing of grain is not the best form of farming in the Ozarks and they are turning their attention to the growing of fruits and to the dairy, poultry and stock business. The Chamber of Commerce also has under consideration a proposition for the location of a cheese factory here. Kansas City Journal.

One Killed, Five Injured When Automobile Crashes Through Rail at James River Bridge

Mrs. Nancy Snider, 60 years old, of Norwood, was killed and her husband, J. P. Snider, a son, George P. Snider, and his wife, Mrs. Nattie Snider, suffered serious injuries about 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon when the automobile in which they were riding crashed through the rail at the side of a bridge over the James river. The accident occurred about 3 miles southeast of here, and the car fell to the river bank, pinning the occupants of the car underneath. George Snider, Jr., 4 years old, and Alice Bernice Snider, 6 months old were only slightly bruised. J. P. Snider was driving the car, according to his statement last night, and as he made a turn to the north to cross the bridge, his son George Snider became alarmed and grabbed the steering wheel causing him to continue the turn and crash through the guard rail at the east side of the bridge. The car struck the ground just a few feet from the river. Springfield Republican.

Fourth Class Postmaster Examination.

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to be held at Mt. Grove, Mo. on Jan. 6, 1922 as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth class postmaster at Bryant and other vacancies as

they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill any vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$562.00 for the last fiscal year.

Applicants must have reached their twenty first birthday on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a State where women are declared by statute to be at full age for all purposes at eighteen years, women eighteen years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application blanks, Form 1753, and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at the place of vacancy or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practical date.
