Madagasca Letter. The different sections of the country I found that the people differed somewhat in their treatment of the crocodile. Some tribes never harm them, while others retaliate upon them whenever human beings are devoured-life for life. The inhabitants living upon the shores of a lake called Itasy are accustomed to make a yearly proclamation to the crocodiles of the lake. The sorcerer making the proclamation stands on the shore near the water, and, stretching out his arms over the lake, cries out in a loud voice warning the crocodiles in the name of some supreme being, called Andriamanitra, that any deaths among the people caused by them will be duly avenged by the killing of as many in return. The well disposed crocodiles are then warned to keep out of the way, as the people do notquarrel with them but only with their evil-minded relatives, who have taken human life. This superstition relative to the crocodiles does not seem to extend to the crocodile's eggs, for in many of the villages the eggs may be found for sale in the market places. Among the people the eggs are considered a great delicacy, and indeed they are very good, but it was sometime before I could overcome my scruples and indulge in them freely. Dogs have a very sagacious way of outwitting the crocodile. I have seen a dog stand on the bank of a stream for some time barking furiously. As soon as all the crocodiles in the vicinity had congregated at the place where the noise was being made, the dog suddenly ran off as fast as possible and swam across at some distance up stream.


