BILLS BEFORE THE N. D. LEGISLATURE

Municipal Corporations: H. B. No. 86, L. L. Twichell—Killed. Providing municipal aid to auditorium. H. B. No. 195, Moore—Do Pass. Provides work of school district clerk in cities shall be done by the city auditor. H. B. No. 196, L. L. Twichell—Do pass. Relating to the bonds for city and village officers. H. B. No. 199, Purcell—Killed. Providing for the fixing of salaries of city commissioners. H. B. No. 200, Moore—Do Pass. Relating to the installing of special lighting district in city under commission form of government. H. B. No. 219, L. Twichell—Do Pass. Municipalities allowed to pay rent for halls and auditoriums used for public meetings.

Ways and Means: H. B. No. 135, Bratton. Providing that county superintendent of health shall receive \$5 per day for time actually spent in discharge of his duties. Amended and recommended to pass. H. B. No. 210, Cooper—Providing that townships may render aid to county fairs. Do pass. H. B. No. 137, Ployhar—Providing that blanks and records used by justices of the peace shall be paid for by the county. Killed.

State Affairs: H. B. No. 240, Pendary—Providing that counties shall pay \$18 per month instead of \$15 for the care of patients at the state asylum for the insane. Killed. H. B. No. 176, Wiley—Providing that county commissioner shall be paid at the rate of \$5 per day and prescribing his office hours. Do pass.

H. B. 174, Boyce—Providing that the state superintendent of public instruction shall send to every postmaster in the state a list of the Sabbath breaking laws of the state. Killed. H. B. No. 230, Purcell—Providing for the appointment of a vice commission. Killed. H. B. No. 204, Smith of Kinder—Providing for the division of the automobile license fund. Killed. H. B. 190, Jahr—Providing that county officers shall not hold office for more than three successive terms but not effecting those now limited to two terms. Killed. H. B. No. 202, Aker—regulating the salary of assistant county attorneys. Killed. H. B. No. 209, Dickson of Dunn—Providing that assessors who act as census enumerators shall receive 4 cents per name instead of 2 cents as at present. Do Pass. H. B. No. 193, Wiley—relating to the salaries of county officers. Amend and do pass. H. B. No. 203, Ployhar—Relating to depositories of school fund. Amended and do pass.

Railroads: H. B. No. 139, Henrickson—Providing that matter of contributory negligence shall be at judgment of the jury and not in hands of the trial judge. Killed. H. B. No. 231, Montgomery—Providing that not more than 12 freight cars shall be used in a mixed train. Killed. H. B. No. 154, Gunthrope—Relating to the building of hog fences by the railroad companies where their land adjoins one side of hog pasture used by land owner. Amended and do pass. H. B. No. 159, Odland—Relating to the keeping of a supply of water at all railroad stock yards. Amended and do pass.

Judiciary: H. B. No. 220, Converse—Relating to the changing of place of trial. Killed. H. B. No. 155, Converse—Same as above and same disposition. H. B. No. 183, Steenson—accident. Do Pass. H. B. No. 197, L. L. Twichell—Relating to the taking of

private property for public use. Amend and do pass. Temperance: H. B. No. 71, Moses—Providing for the appointment of an enforcement officer. Do Pass. School and Public Lands: H. B. No. 217, Sinclair—Providing that the interest on school land contracts shall be reduced from six to five per cent. Killed. H. B. No. 175, Williams—Providing for retirement of bonds on department of school and university lands. Do Pass.

Insurance: H. B. No. 165, Livdahl—Relating to the organization, regulation and management of mutual hail, fire, lighting and cyclone insurance companies. Do Pass. Drainage: H. B. No. 148, Myhre—Relating to drainage. D. Pass. Taxes and Tax Laws: H. B. No. 206, McClellan—Relating to the publication of notice of tax rates and preparation of duplicate tax lists. Killed. H. B. No. 228, Johnson—Providing for 4 mill tax levy for bridge fund instead of 2 mill as at present. Do Pass. H. B. No. 162, Sanbeck—Relating to the listing of property for assessment and providing penalty for evasion. Killed.

Banks and Banking: H. B. No. 221, Converse—Providing that minimum capitalization for state banks shall be \$20,000. Majority report is do pass and minority report indefinite postponement. H. B. No. 81, Burgett—Decreasing the legal reserve fund in state banks. Killed. H. B. 224, Johnson—Bank guaranty law, majority report for indefinite postponement and minority report for passage. Elections and Election Privileges: H. B. No. 102, Hjolmstad—Providing that county auditors return election returns to state secretary ten days after a primary or general election. H. B. No. 185—Providing for manner of reaching decision in case of tie at election. Do Pass. H. B. No. 131, Myhre—Providing for non-partisan school elections. Killed. H. B. No.

H. B. No. 100, by McClellan which was indefinitely postponed in the committee of the whole was reconsidered and re-referred to the committee on ways and means. This is a herd law bill.

H. B. No. 165 by Livdahl which refers to the regulation of insurance companies organized as mutuals in the state was re-referred to the committee on insurance for amendment.

H. B. 115 which provides a maximum wage of \$6.00 per pal for election officers were re-referred to the committee on elections for further consideration.
