After the Otto murderer. Otto Pollnow, a member of the "National Detective Constable Force of the United States and Business Union of Financial Protection," was in town this week with a petition seeking signers, asking the county attorney to issue warrants for the arrest of parties in connection with the Otto murder case. He got quite a number of signers here, as all wish to see the case probed to the bottom. He claims to have asked the county attorney for warrants and was refused. He says he will go before him again with a petition containing two-thirds of the voters of the county and ask for warrants, and, if refused, will present his case to Judge Webber who, he says, will give him papers to the Governor who will instruct the county commissioners to select a new county attorney to take charge of the case.—Morton Enterprise.

They want every American dollar to be as good as any other dollar, and every American promise to pay to mean just what it says. The free, impartial, unlimited coinage of silver and gold into dollars—into actual money—needing no redemption themselves, and being always the ultimate redeemers of every promise to pay money—cuts the ground from under every proposition to issue irredeemable paper, or to experiment with any other fiat scheme, looking to a currency, whose value and volume shall be wholly at the control of changing administration of government. Silver and gold, set at liberty, and honestly coined, will constitute the money whose volume and value will be controlled mainly by natural causes, whose operations will be as open to the thoughtful farmer or laborer as to Wall street or the Rothschilds.—Dakota Huronite.

Scientific investigations are now being conducted on the best manner of farming the great blanket of vegetable mold that forms the soil of North Dakota. Farming has been done here on such a crude scale and in such an ignorant manner that the poorest results have followed instead of the best. There is, beyond question, sufficient moisture every year to get a crop if the rainfall were properly saved in the soil, instead of being assisted in evaporation by ignorant cultivation. Tests with sub-surface packers, to condense and pack the soil, and thereby retain the moisture for crops, have been made during 1893 and 1894 that show astonishing results. They demonstrate beyond question that if the lines of capillary attraction, by which evaporation from the surface is carried on, can be broken up, and the soil beneath packed, there is sufficient moisture every year to grow crops. This year seems a poor one for such experiments, as there promises plenty of rainfall for the most careless farming, but men of intelligence, ability and experience are at work on the problem of teaching the farmers how to farm in every season in this great and fertile region, whose possibilities as a productive country are not even dreamed of.—Jamestown Alert.

No one pretends that there is gold enough to do the business of the world, but it is argued that most of our business transactions are done on a credit basis, therefore we need but little money of final redemption. The men who favor this style of doing business are the ones who make a living off the debts of others, and to whose interest it is that people shall pay Shylock his dues. Those Younger Boys.

The pardoning of the Younger Brothers is being revived and considerable of an effort we understand is being made in their behalf. The life-record of these men within the prison walls for twenty years has been perfect. To pardon them would hardly be the regulation way of treating prisoners who are under sentence for the grave crimes to which they pleaded guilty, but there is probably not a person acquainted with them since their confinement in Stillwater who does not fully believe that if allowed their freedom they would prove good citizens. Society would not suffer by their liberation and it is, as we understand it in the higher sense, for the sake of society more than for the punishment of criminals, that they are incarcerated, much the same as the leper is isolated from his fellows that mankind may not be contaminated with his loathsome disease. This is an age of reform, and the best thought of philanthropists is being given to the uplifting of the fallen. Is it practical to bend every effort towards the reformation of men, and when it is complete give them no power or opportunity to use it? Would it not be a crowning triumph over crime if the warden of Stillwater could open the prison doors wide and say with confidence to every inmate, "go and sin no more?" This of course cannot be done, because the moral conditions of the prisoners would not permit it, but from many authoritative sources we are led to believe that such would be the case with the "Younger boys," and if so, their confinement seems no longer necessary.—Blue Earth City Post.

The Passing of Merriam.

Ex-Gov. Merriam went all the way to Cleveland to be Minnesota's representative on the committee on resolutions, and then the boys turned him down. That was cruel, but it had to be done. The governor's ambition to be on one committee was a part of the plan of the Merriam-Nelson-Clough combine. It was counted on to give the governor additional prestige as a Minnesota leader, that he might use it in national party councils for the benefit of the combine. That was what defeated Merriam. The boys who went with him concluded that, while for many reasons they would have been glad to have Merriam on the resolutions committee, they would not help him to advance the interests of the political faction of which he is the head. Very naturally, Merriam does not enjoy the treatment he received at Cleveland. It is the first time he has ever been defeated by Republicans, the first time he has asked anything of the Republicans, which they have refused to grant; but he will seriously underestimate the significance of the action of the Minnesota delegation if he does not recognize the beginning of an effort to overthrow the dynasty of which he is chief. This effort the Journal believes will not be abandoned till Republican politics in Minnesota have been cured of the ills for the introduction of which he is responsible, and which have come to be known and understood under the description of the Merriam method.

The work done in Cleveland was the result of an alliance between the country and Minneapolis which of itself is suggestive of the way in which the Merriam-Nelson-Clough combine is to be broken up. The vote was also suggestive of what the Republicans of the state can do to deliver themselves from the dominance of the combine when they make up their minds to do so. Twenty-three to 13 was the vote against Merriam and that is about the proportion it may be expected will prevail when the rank and file of the party get a chance to express their preferences and feelings as to the perpetuation of the odious combine which has managed to manipulate the policies of the party in this state for the last seven or eight years and hopes to perpetuate its control indefinitely.—Minneapolis Journal.
