Minister of Foreign Affairs Expires Suddenly in Prussian Territory.

Was Traveling With the Czaron His Trip Through Western Europe.

Pursued a Fc-eign Policy That Threatened the Peace of the World.

LONDON. Sept. 1.-A dispatch to The Telegraph from Kieff says that Prince Lobanoff-Rostovsky, Russian minister of foreign affairs, died suddenly while traveling from Vienna to that place. Prince Lobanoff-Rostovsky was in the company of the czar at the time.

The news of the death of Prince Lobanoff-Rostovsky, according to the dispatch to The Telegraph, caused great excitement throughout Russia, where the personality of the minister of foreign affairs was considered to be second only to the czar himself. Prince Lobanoff-Rostovsky pursued a strong foreign policy-a policy which was regarded in some quarters as threatening

the peace of the world. The tour which he had planned to take with the czar through the countries of Western Europe was expected to be most farreaching in results affecting the settlement of the Eastern question, and his death at the present juncture is regarded as a most dramatic and important event, upsetting, as it does, all possibilities of conferences between the foreign ministers of the great powers and compelling the czar to change the plans concerning his tour through Germany, France and England.

Summoned the Minister's Deputy. St. Petersburg, Sept. 1.-Following the death of Prince Lobanoff-Restovsky, the Russian minister for foreign affairs, the czar has summoned the deputy of the Russian minister for foreign affairs, M. Chickine, to Kief.
