OBITUARY

MRS. MARIE TAUER.
Mrs. Marie Tauer died Thursday
morning at 8:30 at the home of her son
George in the town of Sigel, aged 79
years. Death was due to old age and
the ailments that usually come with
advancing years. She had been in poor
health all summer.

The deceased, whose maiden name
was Maria Hammerschmidt, was born
in Kreis Pilsen, Bohemia, Austria, No-
vember 17, 1835, where she spent her
childhood days and grew to womanhood.
She was married to George Tauer in the
old country in 1860 and in 1866 they
emigrated to America coming directly
to New Ulm. They immediately moved
onto a farm in the Town of Sigel where
they took up farming. Her husband
died 20 years ago and since then she has
made her home with her son George who
is now operating the farm.

Mrs. Tauer is survived by three sons,
Andrew who lives in the Town of Lake
Hanska and Anton and George who live
in the Town of Sigel. She is also sur-
vived by a sister, Mrs. Magdalena Nei-
decker of Chicago, and two brothers,
Franz Hammerschmidt of Chicago and
Jos. Hammerschmidt of Wabasso. At
the time of her death she was a member
of the Mother Society of the Catholic
Church, the members of which attended
the funeral in a body. The funeral was
held Monday morning at 9:30 from Holy
Trinity Church, Rev. Schlunkert of-
ficiating. Interment was made in the
Catholic Cemetery.

MRS. WILLIAM WELLNITZ
Mrs. William Wellnitz of the Town of
Eden passed away December 31st fol-
lowing childbirth. The deceased was
only 35 years old. She was born July
3, 1876, in the Town of Eden as the
daughter of Mr. and Mrs. August Ditt-
benner and has always made Eden her
home. About 8 years ago she was mar-
ried to William Wellnitz, her surviving
husband, with 3 small children who
mourn her untimely death. She is also
survived by her mother, Mrs. Kathryn
Dittbenner of Morgan, two sisters, Mrs.
William Hilgert and Mrs. William Rhode
also of Morgan and two brothers, Fred
and Robert of Eden township. The
funeral was held from the Lutheran
Church in Eden Sunday afternoon, Rev.
Horn officiating. Mr. and Mrs. Her-
man Fixsen and Mrs. Herman G. Kies-
ling uncle and aunts of the deceased,
attended the funeral from here.

THEODORE HAASE
Word was received here Tuesday that
Theo. Haase of St. Paul, husband of
Sophie, the oldest daughter of Mr. and
Mrs. Carl Burg had died that morning
at 5 o'clock. Death was due to heart
failure. The deceased was only 31
years old and was in the employ of the
Hamm Brewing Co. when he died. He
was married to Miss Burg in St. Paul
five years ago and they have lived there
ever since. The funeral will be held
from his late home Thursday morning
Mr. and Mrs. Max Burg will attend from
here.

MRS. ANNA ZEIG
Mrs. George Zeig, nee' Anna Schloegel,
died at Loretto Hospital Thursday
evening at 7:15 aged 44 years. Death
due to cancer of the liver with which
ailment she had been suffering for
months. She had been at the hospital
for four weeks before her death. During
the fall she had been at the hospital for
several weeks also and submitted to an
operation, but nothing could be done to
stop the progress of the disease.
The deceased was born in Bohemia on
January 3, 1871 and came to America
with her parents the following year.
They came directly to New Ulm and
located on a farm in the Town of Sigel
where the daughter spent her childhood
days and grew to womanhood. In June
of 1891 she was married at the Catholic
Church in New Ulm to George Zeig, and
since then they have made their home
in the Town of Sigel. Of the 7 children
born to them, three died in infancy.

Mrs. Zeig is survived by her husband
two sons, George and Joseph and two
daughters, Mary and Clara, who are
all at home. She is also survived by
four brothers, Adam and John who live
on a farm near Buffalo Lake and Joseph
and Wenzel of the Town of Sigel. One
sister, Mrs. Barbara Moldan of the Town
of Albin also mourns her death. Mrs.
Zeig was a member of the St. Elizabeth
Society. The funeral was held Satur-
day morning at 10 o'clock, Rev. Schlunkert
officiating. Interment was made
in the Catholic Cemetery.

MRS. ELIZABETH HAIN.
Wednesday afternoon at 5 o'clock Mrs.
Elizabeth Hain passed away at the home
of her son-on-law, William Muesing, on
North Franklin Street. Death was due
to old age. Altho she has been quite
feeble for some time she was still able
to be around until Christmas day when she
was forced to take to her bed and was
not able to be up again.
The deceased, whose maiden name was
Elizabeth Fuchs, was born in Hessen
Nassau, Germany, March 9, 1838 and
was consequently 76 years old when she
died. She came to America when she
was 16 years old, both her parents having
died and an uncle of hers sent for her
to come and make her home with his

family. She lived with her uncle's
family in Chicago for five years when she
was married to Johann Hain in 1859.
The following year they came to New Ulm
and the deceased has made her home here
ever since. Of the children born to her
one died in infancy and her husband
died 26 years ago.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs.
William Muesing of New Ulm and Mrs.
Henry Hellmann of Nicollet, and 13
grandchildren. The funeral was held
Saturday afternoon with services at the
Muesing home at one o'clock and at the
Lutheran Church at 1:30. Rev. Al-
brecht officiated at the church and Prof.
Meyer at the grave. Interment was
made in the Lutheran cemetery.

MRS. DORA WANKUM
Word was received here Saturday that
Mrs. Henry Wankum had died that
day at a hospital in St. Paul of old age.
She had been in failing health for some
time and Death came to her as a relief.

The deceased whose maiden name
was Dora Cordes was born in Repke,
Hannover, Germany October 12, 1839
and had passed the 75th milestone when
she was summoned. In 1874, on August
31st, she was married in Zelle, Hannover,
Germany to Henry Wankum, her sur-
viving husband. They emigrated to
America in the year 1881 and came
directly to New Ulm where they made
their home until they moved to St. Paul
in 1907. Last August they celebrated
the 40th anniversary of their wedding.
No children were born to them and she
is survived only by her husband, one
brother, Henry Cordes of this city and
one sister, Mrs. Maria Schmidt of St.
Paul. The funeral was held yesterday
afternoon from a Lutheran church in
St. Paul. Mr. Charles Cordes and Mrs.
Ed. Cordes attended the funeral from
here.

JAMES DICKSON
James Dickson, for many years a
resident and at one time Mayor of the
village of Springfield died at his home in
Springfield Monday morning, aged 71
years. The funeral will be held Thurs-
day morning from his late home. He will

CHRISTIAN BARTL
Christian Bartl, a well known retired
farmer of the Town of Lafayette was
not destined to enjoy city life for very
long. About 14 months ago he retired
from active life and moved to New Ulm
where he built himself a comfortable
home on North Minnesota Street. Sun-
day morning at 9 o'clock he was suddenly
stricken with apoplexy and passed
away shortly afterwards. He had
suffered a slight stroke on the second day
of Christmas but had apparently com-
pletely recovered from this attack and
was ready to go down town when he
suffered the second stroke which proved
fatal.

The deceased was born in the Pilsener
Kreis, Bohemia, December 25, 1853
and was consequently only 61 years old
when he died. In 1872 he emigrated
to America and located first in Menasha,
Wis. Here he was married the same
year to Theresia Kachelmeier who
survives him. The following year they
came to Minnesota and settled on a
farm in the Town of Lafayette where
they continued to reside until they
removed to New Ulm.

The deceased is survived by his widow
and the following children: Mrs. Wm.
Brinkmann, St. Paul; Anton Bartl, New
Ulm; Mrs. George Wager, St. George;
Mrs. Jos. Martinka, Mrs. Ben Fast and
Anna, Ida and Josephine of this city.
One child died in infancy. He is also
survived by one sister, Mrs. Theresia
Dietz of Milwaukee, one half brother,
Mike Bartl of New Ulm, two half sisters,
Mrs. Frances Preisinger from here and
Mrs. Clara Mack of North Dakota. At
the time of his death Mr. Bartl was a
member of the local Court of Foresters
and they will attend the funeral in a
body. He was a man of sterling charac-
ter and had thru his kindness and de-
votion to duty won the respect and
esteem of his neighbors and friends who
regret that he was removed from his
field of activity in the prime of life.

The funeral will be held Thursday
morning at 9:30 from the Catholic
Church. Rev. Schlunkert will officiate
and interment will be made in the
Catholic Cemetery.

weird playing and sensational tackling

occasional flashes of real basketball
which showed that the old High School
heroes hadn't forgotten all they knew
of the game. The Alumni were confident
of winning, and after they had doffed
their halos and trotted out on the floor
for a preliminary workout, the spectators
felt a feeling of pity ooze out for the
Actives.

The first half gave the Alumni a com-
fortable lead, both sides mixing in with
a commendable vigor and enthusiasm.
Cordes seemed to be the particularly
glowing luminary for the Alumni, both
in the speed with which he covered the
floor and the versatility with which he
registered minority opinions at each
decision of the referee. He played the
running guard position and besides
covering his man in good shape he
managed to percolate through the
opposing defense for three field baskets.

Huhn played his old position at for-
ward. He garnered several baskets in
the first half with nonchalant ease, but
in the second half the strain told on his
endurance, and he swiftly settled down
into a position of watchful waiting.
In the first half "Fatty" Backer was put
into the center position. He had a
decided advantage over his opponent
on the jump as his rotund personality
acted as an effective barrier over quite
a field of neutral territory. He managed
to create quite a disturbance among the
Actives by casually dribbling the ball
toward the basket through the surround-
ing landscape without much regard to
the opposition of the other team or the
pleadings of the referee.

In the second half Herzog and Amann
broke loose for the Actives and swamped
the weakened Alumni by a total of ten
field baskets. The team work of the
Alumni went to pieces, and their guard-
ing was extremely loose, often leaving
both forwards free under their own
baskets.
