REQUIREMENTS STATED

Department of Education Explains How State Aid May Be Secured.

Principals of schools in Arkansas yesterday were notified by the State Educational Department that before a public school in the state can receive aid in teaching elementary agriculture. home economics and manual training, it must meet the requirements of the State Board of Education. To receive aid a school must have at least 10 pualty of 25 per cent of all taxes due, pils in the various classes, the monthly salaries of teachers must be not less than \$75 per month and reports must be made to the Department of Education.

> The board will match the funds of local boards, dollar for dollar, in the payment of teachers' salaies, providing the sum granted o any four-year high school shall not exceed \$500 in one year or instruction in industrial sub--cts. The sum granted a threeear high school is not to exand \$400 and \$300 to a twoy ar high school. The board reserves the right to give \$600 to a y school that meets its req irements for training teachers. l'o secure state aid all schools a e required to pay the full salaies of teachers once each month.
