TRAINING OF DISABLED SOLDIERS AND SAILORS.

In order to take training under the Board, a soldier, sailor marine or nurse must have resigned or have been dis charged from the military service un der honorable conditions since April 7, 1917, and must have been so disa bled that vocational education is nee essary to overcome the handicap of

his disability. In the restraining of the injured soldiers the Federal Board makes use of all the educational institutions, both institutions, both public and private. that provide courses suitable to its needs. It also makes use of factories shops, stores, Navy Yards, banks, commercial institutions, etc., which provide courses that may be needed in particular cases. In each instance contract are made with the institutions by which the Board is permitted to super vise the course of instruction given. The Board pays the expense of tuition, books, appliances, etc., and make an allowance of not more than \$80. per month for subsistence to a single man and \$115 per month to a married man without children. Additional allowances are made for each dependent

WANTS PROFITS KNOWN

McAdoo Says Tax Returns Can Show Mine Owners' Receipts.

New York, Nov. 25.-A showdown onProfits made by bituminous operators is needed for the American people to form a just opinion on the coal situation, William G. McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury, declared today

Mr. McAdoo's statement was made after he had been read an Associated Press dispatch from Washington giving the substance of an open telegram addressed to him by the operators, criticising him for "injecting" himself into the wage controversy. Mr. Mc-Adoo had not received the telegram.

"The question is whether or not the income tax returns filed under oath will give an understanding of the truth and facts. If they are making excessive profits, as they were clearly making in 1917, then any increase of wages that may be made to the miners should not be passed on to the public in the form of increased prices for bituminous coal, A showdown will enable the American people to form a just opinion."
