Henry and Lloyd Glass were at prayer meeting Saturday night.

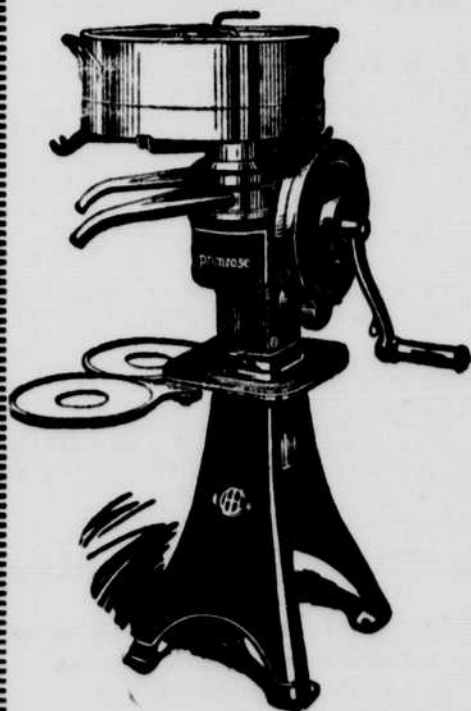
