## COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES HELD LAST NIGHT

The commencement exercises of the Prescott high school was held last night in the school auditorium before a large crowd of patrons and others interested in the schools. The exercises were excellently rendered each of the youthful participants rendering his part of the program in a very commendable manner.

The exercises were opened with a prayer by Rev. J. A. Parker after which Superintendent Hirst gave a brief outline of the accomplishments of the Prescott High School, among which was the addition of the local school to the accredited southern list of schools. This list includes only the high schools, Prof. Hirst said, whose student graduates will be admitted to any of the colleges or universities of the country without examination. He stated that three young men from this school would enter Wet Point Military Academy this year. Eleven out of the fourteen graduates of the present term, he said, will attend some college or university next year, which is a splendid showing. He also spoke of some of the other attainments of the Prescott high school, all of which go to prove the advancement and rapid strides being made.

Dr. Alonzo Monk of Hope delivered a very instructive address on "The Subject of Obligation" mixing a liberal amount of wit and funny yarns in, which, to quote him, served to keep his audience from sleeping too

soundly until he had finished. His sound doctrine meted out to the graduates as well as to the audience was not only timely, but was well worth pondering over and taking into the daily walks of life.

W. V. Tompkins, acting in the absence of president McKenzie, of the school board, delivered the diplomas to the graduates.

**Sand Long Retained Properties.**  
Prof. H. L. Fairchild of the University of Rochester and Dr. H. Carrington Bolton of New York found the sands at Rockaway beach emitting a high musical note one summer day in 1884. They collected some of the sand and took it home, where Prof. Fairchild put in a large glass bottle a sample, but except for that one instance the sand has been undisturbed for more than thirty-five years.

Professor Fairchild writes now to Science, saying that on December 2, 1919, he poured the contents of the bottle into a stocking and found that when quickly compressed it still gave out its characteristic high note, audible at a considerable distance. But since he spread it out in a dry room and handled it considerably it has lost its sonorous quality.

**Reproductivity of Pearls.**  
There is nothing new under the sun, and the idea of placing pearls in a bag with a little rice, and finding after many years that their numbers have increased, a very ancient practice, is claiming attention in the English press. That the rice has the appearance of being "pecked" adds a further touch of the familiar, and people are asking what kind of rice pearls like best. In the time of Boetius de Boot, the reproductivity not only of pearls but of diamonds was a common belief. The explanation that the pearls now occupying attention are vegetable pearls from the Malay states would not have satisfied Boetius.
