

SENSATIONS FROM POLITICAL CAMPS

WILL BE "QUICK AND FAST" UNTIL AUGUST 10.—CANDIDATES HAVE THEIR EYES ON EACH OTHER.

Little Rock, May 24.—The time has come in the political campaign when interesting developments may be expected over night.

From now until the 10th of August there will be no end of sensational things happening. It couldn't be otherwise with so many candidates in the field, and the issues drawn along lines of such high tension.

One of the latest is the refusal of Senator W. F. Kirby to meet Congressman Caraway in joint discussion. Mr. Caraway has returned to Washington on official business, and it will be several days before his reply can be made public.

In the meantime Senator Kirby reiterates his charges and denials, and adds: "Now having lost, your mud-slinging campaign having failed, you ask a joint debate on question of veracity which are easily determined by the Congressional Record, a joint discussion which could only result in crimination and recrimination in unimportant matters and clear no material issue in the campaign."

Senator Kirby remind his opponent that charges made by him "have been shown false by the record, and that his threats will not deter him from continuing to denounce them as such."

In conclusion he says that he declines "at this time" a joint campaign and adds, "You will have to find your own audience to talk to."

Senator Kirby will make announcement this week of several speaking dates.

This bridge means the opening up of important trade territory to Prescott. Just ask some of our merchants if that is true.

E. J. Watson will have something to say about the crops along the P. & N. W. and also about the probability of making Prescott a strawberry market next year.

The Extension Division Agricultural Department of the United States is anxious that we get behind the potato crop in this county and push the erection of a potato curing house here. In the meantime talk to your farmer friends and let the club know Thursday night how they feel about it.

JUDGE HAYNIE TALKS

Sheridan, Ark., May 23.—Judge W. R. Haynie of Prescott, candidate for governor, addressed a fairly good sized crowd of men and women at the court house here in the interest of his candidacy. He favored the abolition of the state highway department, doing away with many of the state commissions and boards, opposed local legislation unless the constitution was fully complied with. Favored a graduated land tax, initiative and referendum and a general clean up of the state penitentiary system. He favored good roads, but opposed all road districts unless the matter be referred to the taxpayers. He flayed his opponents T. C. McRae, J. C. Floyd and Smead Powell to the delight of his hearers. This was Judge Haynie's first trip here and he made many friends, as was shown by the frequent applause he received from both men and women. He left at once for Prattsville in the western part of the county where he will speak tonight.

ARKANSAS BUYS TOO MUCH STUFF SHE CAN RAISE

A generally disregarded reason for the high cost of living in Arkansas has been given by Jim G. Ferguson,

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commissioner of mines, manufacture and agriculture. He has found that Arkansas residents are eating Irish potatoes from Minnesota and Colorado; tomatoes from Virginia, onions and cabbage from Texas, corn products from Illinois; milk from Washington; sweet potatoes from Georgia, syrup and jellies from New York, apples from Oregon, peaches and pears from California, flour from Kansas, bacon and lard from Missouri and beef from Montana.

These products, Mr. Ferguson said, can be and are to some degree, produced in Arkansas and millions of dollars are lost in handling these products from outside the state.
