### NEGROES TO MEET

Meeting Will Be at Freeman's Chapel Wednesday Morning.

The Second Annual session of the District Conference of the Texarkana district of the Southwest Annual Conference of the C. M. E. church with the Rev. W. Canway Smith, D. D., of Little Rock as the presiding elder, will convene in Freeman's Chapel C. M. E. church, Ashdown, on Wednesday morning, July 19th at 9:30 a. m.

There will be more than one hundred and fifty delegates present from all points of the district. This conference will continue five days, closing out on Sunday night, July 23rd. Reports will be taken from the different churches for the education and mission departments of the state. Solicitors will be on the streets during the meeting. The presiding elder will take this method to reach the loyal-hearted white people of Ashdown to ask their aid in this way to help the colored Methodist church South, in its struggle to save its boys and girls.
