NO FAKE EXCUSES

When Telegraphing Soldier That His Folks Are Sick Be Sure They Are.

Little Rock, Aug. 12.—When families of soldiers stationed at Camp Pike invent excuses to get them away on leave they should be careful and invent a story that is puncture proof. Also they should not forget that the Red Cross and the army is working hard in hand on such propositions, and ordinary excuses are easily detected, if they are false. A negro in Pine Bluff stands in danger of a heavy sentence for his activity in trying to get his brother out of the camp, and the brother must serve an extended term in the guard house for his part in the effort at deception.

The negro in Pine Bluff telegraphed to his brother, a drafted man, stating that his wife was very ill and he must hasten home if he was to be there when the end came. The telegram was immediately turned over to the Red Cross, as are all telegrams of this nature, thereby insuring a more hasty response. The Red Cross investigates before the man is permitted to go, and within a few hours after the receipt of the telegram, back came the information that the wife of the enlisted negro was not only well, but in Little Rock. The arrest of both negroes was then ordered and examples will be made of them.

 WIFE KILLS HUSBAND

Shooting Said to Have Followed Quarrel Over Vaccinating Children.

Men, Aug. 12.—J. H. Ammons, living near Hatfield, was shot and instantly killed Sunday morning about 10:30 o'clock by his wife, after a quarrel over vaccinating the children. It is said that after the quarrel Ammons gave his wife 30 minutes to leave the house, and as she went out into the yard under a tree she took a shotgun and killed him. She is reported to have said that she had to shoot in self-defense, because her husband had threatened her. Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Wright Pickett and Deputy Sheriff Bratcher went to Hatfield Sunday and arranged for an inquest, the result of which has not been ascertained. Ammons was shot last winter by Officers Dahazell and Joe Emerson when they went to his home on Mountain Fork to arrest him. He lost an arm as a result of the wound. Since spring he has been farming near Hatfield.

TRAIN SEVERS BODY

Curtis Meeks of Near Holly Springs Was Sitting on Track.

Men, Aug. 12.—Curtis Meeks, aged about 20, son of S. E. Meeks, who lives near Holly Springs, was run over and instantly killed by passenger train No. 3, about one mile north of Acorn last night. The train wheels cut his body in two. Young Curtis was sitting on the track as though asleep, and was not seen until the train was almost upon him. The body will be taken to Vandervoort, his former home, for burial.
