MADE QUEER BARGAINS,

Mutually Beneficial Agreements Between g. Physicians and the Victims of Incura-ble Diseases—A Traffic in Abaormal Heads.

The science of surgery is at present largely directed toward discovering the nature of abnormal growths, unusual diseases and deformities. The directors at the hospitals keep a keen lookent for cases which seem likely to develop something of extraordinary interest.

A novel plan has been adopted of making a bargain with a person suffering with some extraordinary affliction, which binds him to have delivered to the surgeons at death either the entire body or such part of it as may be specified in the contract, and which is likely to prove of peculiac value from a surgical standpoint.

These contracts are regularly drawn up, signed and witnessed, and would probably hold as well in law as a contract for the future delivery of a parcel of real estate, although no case in which litigation has arisen for breach of contract on either side has yet been made public. There can be no question that the bargain is a beneficial cne to both parties. The sufferer, if he be in needy circumstances, is assured a decent burial. The physician, from a wide range of subjects, is free to choose such as passer interesting and profitable results. Persons whose bodies have been thus contracted for are known among dectors as "healthy cadavers," a paradoxical and somewhat disrespectful term, but sufficiently explanat ry.

In transactions of this sort every detail is conducted with perfect delicacy. If the patient is suffering from some incurable disease, from the effects of which the physicians have made up their minds that he must die in a given time, the news is gently broken to his friends, a contract is drawn and signed and the patient pursues the even tenor of his way, in blissful ignorance that his days are numbered or that a price has been set on his body.

If he has no relatives or friends, he is delicately approached by the physician and the facts are revealed with all possible consideration. He is made to understand that death is sure to come after a certain period and a round sum is offered. If he be at all reasonable and open to conviction, he will invariably accept the money and sign the contract.

Of course it is not always certain that the patient will die before the

Of course it is not always certain that the patient will die before the physician, and this fact has led to some rather curious consequences. One patient at Bellevue hospital, who has been there longer than any other, has reaped quite an income from repeated sales of his head. It seems to be a part of the ethics of this peculiar bargaining that, in case the patient survives the surgeon, he shall be at liberty to enter into another contract.

This Bellevue patient's name is 'Mike' Kelly. He is a small man, about 55 years old, and suffers from six tumors on the tight side of the face, Mr. Kelly attracted the attention of Professor John R. Wood, of the hospital, who had made a specialty of tumors, and the professor was often observed eyeing the tumors. A careful examination showed that they were incurable, and that an attempt to remove them might result fatally.

Finally the professor, whose desire to possess the tumors increased, made an agreement by which Kelly, in consideration of a certain sum, was to allow his head, after death, to be deliveaed over for examination. Dr. Wood exhibited Keely as a curlosity in which he had a proprietary interest, and proudly related to his fellow physicians how he had secured the tumors all for his own use after Mr. Kelly's demiss. Soon afterward the doctor died.

This pledge, like the previous one, was dissolved by the death of the physician, and Mr. Kelly smiled softly. Artificial Ice Surfaces.

A successful system of producing artificial ice surfaces has been inaugurated in Paris, and available in large areas at all seasons of the year. As explained, the machinery consists of two ammonia ice machiners, driven by two fifty-horse power steam engines; this ice apparatus has pumps which force ammoniacal gas into water-cooled condensers, liquefying the gas, which passes into large reservoirs, where it expands with the production of cold, the same gas being pumped back and used continuously. In the application of this system for the formation of a skating surface, a rink has been constructed sixty by 130 feet, having a floor of cork and cement, upon this being laid three miles of connected iron pipe; through this pipe circulates a solution of chloride of calcium, an uncongealable liquid, which, by passage through spirals in the refrigerating reservoirs, is cooled to some five to twenty degrees below zero. The water over the pipe is thus kept frozen, and daily sweeping and flooding insure smoothness.
