Our City Dads.

The city council met in regular session on Thursday evening, April 13, and after closing up the business of the old council, a canvas of the vote of the election held on April 4, 1899, was had, which resulted in the declaring of John C. Jenkins as being elected mayor of the city, and the following aldermen: First ward, Oscar Williams; second ward, Daniel Fuelscher; third ward, William Job; fourth ward, Thomas Bennett. The gentlemen named being present took the oath of office, whereupon the old council adjourned sine die. After a short recess the new council was called to order by Mayor Jenkins, and, after roll call, went into executive session, when the following officers were elected by the council: City clerk and treasurer, M. K. Sullivan; marshal and street commissioner, Thomas C. Bowden; water commissioner, Frank J. Bullene; water tax collector, Elizabeth Stevens; night police, Philip Edwards; police judge, Thomas Hooper; surveyor, Samuel A. Rank. The council then adjourned until Monday evening, April 17.

The council met pursuant to adjournment on the evening above named, when the bonds of the newly elected officers, excepting city clerk and treasurer, were read, approved and placed on file. The latter has since been approved.

Council adjourned.

Another Pioneer Gone.

The Greeley Republican of March 15 says, Charles E. Goodfellow, a well-known resident of this city for many years, died at the Homeopathic hospital in Denver last Friday evening of liver complaint and other ailments. He was in his 62nd year and had been a sufferer for several years. Deceased came to Colorado in 1858, locating in Central City, where he engaged in mining and other pursuits, accumulating a small fortune. Later he met with reverses and during the last years of his life was reduced to more or less straitened circumstances. He was industrious and honest and ever willing to work when able. His remains were brought to Greeley and funeral services were held from the office of Undertaker Macy on Monday afternoon, interment being made at Lynn Grove cemetery. He leaves five daughters Mrs. Ella Blaney, Mrs. Carrie Stewart, and Mrs. Ivarine Stewart of this city, Mrs. Lake of Denver, and Mrs. Burton of Valparaiso, Ind., and three sons, Robert, Ralph and Raymond of this city, and one brother, Chandler, of this city.
