PETERSON TALKS TO CITY FEDERATION

The City Federation of Women's clubs met Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the council chamber in city hall, this being the regular monthly meeting of the organization.

Senator W. O. Peterson spoke regarding the new bill on compulsory education in Colorado which the federation is endeavoring to initiate at the next general election. Most of the afternoon was spent in the discussion of this bill and the difference between it and the compulsory education law as now stands.

Mrs. W. F. McCleary gave a report of the meeting of the state executive board held in Denver recently, stating that the scholarship fund under the charge of Mrs. Harding of Canon City is now providing for the education of three girls who are attending college.

Mrs. McCleary stressed the need of more funds for this work.

The question of women of Colorado serving on juries was also discussed and it has been found that the men of the state are not in favor of it, many of the women being of the same opinion.

Mrs. John A. Martin, chairman of the relief committee, reported that ten families which the federation has been caring for had been re-visited and it was found that they needed further aid. The cases have been turned over to the Salvation Army and the women's clubs will co-operate with that body in aiding these and other families.

Mrs. Juan Rayner, president of the federation, presided at the meeting.

Cash prizes will be awarded in two groups, high school and grade school as follows: High school, 1st, \$20; 2nd, \$15; 3rd, \$10; 4th, \$5. Grade school, 1st, \$20; 2nd, \$15; 3rd, \$10; 4th, \$5; 5th, \$2.50; 6th, \$2.50; 7th, \$2.50 and 8th, \$2.50. The reason for the list of prizes for the grade schools being larger than that for high school is due to the fact that so many more pupils from the former schools are entering the contest, there being several hundred altogether.

Musical companies of the city have offered the following prizes: D. Z. Phillips, a \$25 Victrola to the child with the highest score from grades 5 and 6 who has not received a prize; Silver State, \$20 in merchandise to second highest score, same conditions as Phillips company prize; Pueblo Phonograph, five Edison records to third highest score from grades 5 and 6 to child who is not included in those winning cash prizes; Music Shop and Lewis-Brown, \$15 worth of records, each, to be awarded the school having the highest attendance and highest average score; Knight-Campbell, silver cup to school, grade or high, having highest individual score; cup to remain the property of the school winning it two out of three times.

The National Bureau for the Advancement of Music, New York City, C. M. Tremaine, director, will give three medals, a gold a silver and a bronze one, to the children making the three highest scores, either grade or high school. The interest the National Bureau is taking in the local contest is demonstrated by the offering of the medals.

**Violating P. O. Rules
Is Common Thing**

Violating postal rules is not a rare thing, but when a person violates a postal rule in communicating with the postmaster, a real rare thing is produced. Such has been the experience of C. W. Pfaffenberger, in charge of the local postoffice, who says that an investigation of the letter will be in order.

The letter received by Pfaffenberger has a stamp pasted on it which was cut from a stamped envelope. A stamp on stamped envelopes or post cards is good only when on them as placed

when printed. This particular letter crudely showed that the stamp had been cut from a stamped envelope and glued to another envelope, but it is thought that the person doing it was unaware that it was in violation of the postal laws.

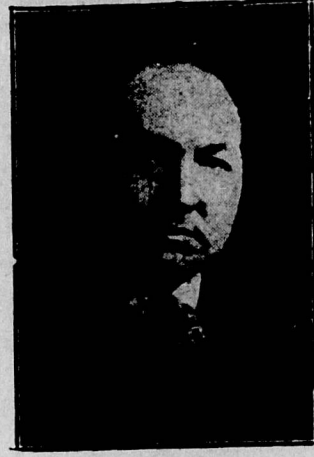
