STEEL CORPORATION.

Some Concise Facts Regarding the Holdings of the Big Concern.

The plants of the United States Steel corporation, owned and controlled by it Jan. 1st, 1906, consisted of ninety-three blast furnaces, sixteen Bessemer steel works, sixteen open-hearth steel works, seven T. rail mills, thirty-eight sheet and tin plate mills, twenty-two bridge and structural plants, eighteen tube mills and a large number of other establishments, including bar mills, plate mills and wire, rod and nail mills. In addition to its manufacturing plants the corporation owns iron mines in the Lake Superior region having an annual output of 22,000,000 tons, a marine equipment operated in conjunction with the ore properties consisting of seventy steamers and thirty barges and seventy-three coking plants. The subsidiary companies own 63,004 acres of coaling coal in Pennsylvania and lease 50,000 acres in the Pocahontas district, West Virginia; also 32,724 acres of steam coal properties. The corporation owns water plants, natural gas properties, and ore docks at various points on the lakes. Various railroad lines, including the Elgin, Joliet and Eastern, the Pittsburgh, Bessemer and Lake Erie railroad, the Duluth and Iron Range railroads and the Duluth, Missabe and Northern railway are also owned or controlled by constituent companies, making a total on Jan. 1st, 1906, of 814.58 miles and an equipment consisting of 680 locomotives and 31,735 cars. The authorized stock of the United States Steel corporation is \$1,100,000,000, equally divided between common and preferred. On Jan. 1st, 1906, the corporation had issued \$508,302,500 of common and \$380,281,100 of preferred, or a total of \$888,583,600.

Ordinance No. 24.

An Ordinance relating to the sale or disposal

of spirituous, vinous, malt or fermented

liquors and to the issuance of licenses there-

for, and providing penalties for sale of said

liquors without license therefor.

The Village Council of the Village of

Mountain Iron, of the County of St. Louis

and State of Minnesota, do ordain as fol-

lows:

SECTION 1.

It shall be unlawful for any person, per-

son, firm or corporation to sell, give, fur-

nish or dispose of in any manner, either di-

rectly or indirectly, by agent, employee or

otherwise any spirituous, vinous, malt or fer-

mented liquor in any quantity or for any

purpose whatever within the limits of the

Village of Mountain Iron without first ob-

taining a license for that purpose from the

Village Council of Mountain Iron.

SECTION 2.

No license for the sale of intoxicating

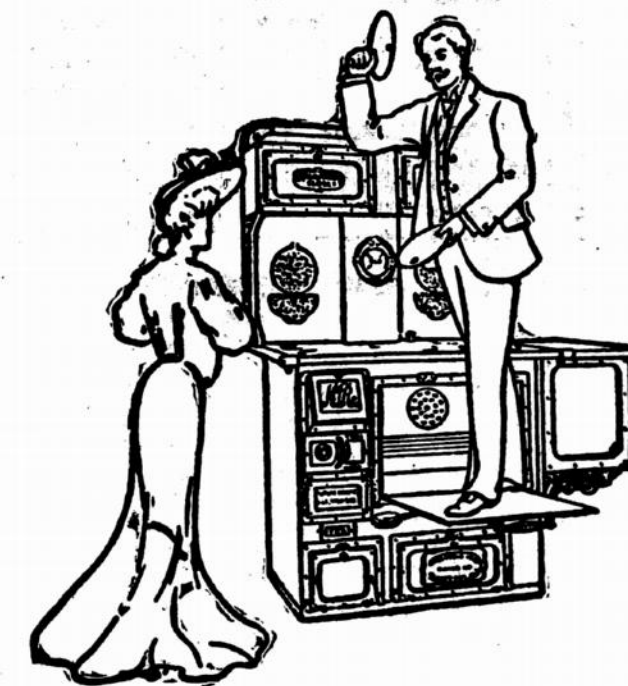
liquors shall be granted to any person ap-

plying for the same under the provisions of

or student, in any public school or other institution of learning, or to any intemperate person or to any habitual drunkard.

SECTION 4.

All applications to sell intoxicating liquors under the provisions of this ordinance shall be in writing, and shall designate the place where such business is to be carried on. Upon receiving and such application the Village Recorder shall cause a notice of such application, containing the name of the applicant, a description of the premises stated in the application, and the time when the same will be heard, to be published in the official newspaper of said Village of Mountain Iron at least two weeks (2) immediately preceding the time of such hearing.

Any person may appear at the time stated and object to the granting of such license, and if it shall appear to the Village Council that the applicant has knowingly violated any of the laws of this state or of the ordinances of the Village of Mountain Iron relating to the sale of intoxicating liquors within one year, preceding such application, or that he has violated any law relating to the sale of intoxicating liquors to minors, habitual drunkards, or intemperate drinkers, after receiving a notice forbidding such sale within five years preceding such application, said Village Council shall refuse to grant the license.

SECTION 5.

Licenses for the sale of liquors as provided herein, outstanding at any one time, are hereby limited to Three (3) in number, and no license shall be issued or granted by said Village Council exceeding said number at any one time. Applications for licenses shall be filed and acted upon in the order received, and upon the expiration of any existing license, the application first filed which complies with all the conditions of this ordinance and which shall be approved by the said Village Council shall be granted a license.

At any time when less than Three (3) licenses are in force, any suitable person, whose application, bond and sureties shall be approved by the Village Council and who shall pay to the Village Treasurer One Thousand (\$1,000) Dollars, and who shall file with the Village Recorder said Treasurer's receipt and the bond herebefore mentioned shall be entitled to, and, on demand shall receive a written license, to be signed by the President and attested by the Recorder of said Village of Mountain Iron, and in and to the Village of Mountain Iron, and in and to the County of St. Louis and State of Minnesota, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 6.

No person shall, in any manner, be protected by any permit or license issued by the Village Council of the Village of Mountain Iron unless he shall have paid the full amount required by this ordinance, and no license shall have any force or effect unless the licensee shall have paid therefor the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00).

All licenses granted by the Village of Mountain Iron shall be posted up in a conspicuous place in the room where such business is carried on, and shall distinctly state the amount paid therefor.

SECTION 7.

All licenses granted by the Village of Mountain Iron for the sale of intoxicating liquors, under this ordinance shall contain a description of the premises and room where liquors are licensed to be sold, and any person so licensed who shall sell, barter, or give away any intoxicating liquors outside of or in any place other than the room so named, shall, upon conviction thereof by any Court having jurisdiction, be liable to all the penalties provided in this ordinance for selling liquors without a license.

SECTION 8.

It shall be unlawful for any person in the Village of Mountain Iron, to sell, barter, furnish or dispose of, in any manner, either directly or indirectly, by agent, employee or otherwise, any intoxicating liquors, in any quantity, on any general or special election day, and all places where the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be licensed shall be closed during all hours of every Sabbath, and of every general or special election day and upon week days such places shall not be kept open later than eleven o'clock at night nor earlier than five o'clock in the morning.

SECTION 9.

It shall be unlawful for any person in the Village of Mountain Iron, to sell, barter, furnish or dispose of, in any manner, either directly or indirectly, by agent, employee or otherwise, any intoxicating liquors, in any quantity, on any general or special election day, and all places where the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be licensed shall be closed during all hours of every Sabbath, and of every general or special election day and upon week days such places shall not be kept open later than eleven o'clock at night nor earlier than five o'clock in the morning.

SECTION 10.

No liquor licenses granted under the provisions of this ordinance shall authorize the person named therein to change his place of business from the place named in said license, except such change be first approved by the Village Council, and in any such change of location the old license shall be delivered up for cancellation and a new license shall be issued and new bonds required.

SECTION 11.

The provisions of this ordinance shall not be so construed as to prohibit any pharmacist or druggist in the State of Minnesota, who shall be duly registered as such under the laws of said state, and who shall be actually carrying on the business of a pharmacist or druggist, or dispose of any spirituous, vinous, malted, or malt liquors, in good faith, for medicinal purposes, upon the written prescription of a reputable and duly licensed physician, actually engaged in the practice of his profession, but any such liquor so disposed of shall not be drunk or used on the premises where obtained.

SECTION 12.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 13.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
