

# OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNTY BOARD, MARSHALL COUNTY, MINNESOTA

Adjourned meeting of the County Board held Aug. 8th, 1922.

Meeting called to order at 10 o'clock a. m. All members present.

Pursuant to notice the Board proceeded to call bids to build and the following bids were received:

Anderson Bros., bid for \$1,200.00. Removal of old bridge, \$50.00.

Minneapolis Bridge Co., \$1,200.00. Removal of old bridge, \$100.00.

Valley Construction Co., \$1,300.00. Removal of old bridge, \$75.00.

On motion the bid of Anderson Bros. was accepted.

Whereas, the Petition of J. B. Elliott, a freeholder of School District No. 43 in this County, with the approval of the County Superintendent endorsed thereon, representing that he is the owner of the lands hereinafter described, which are situated in said School District, and that said land adjoins School District No. 70, and asking that his said lands may be set off from said District No. 43 and said District No. 70 for the following reasons: The children living on the above described land if transferred to the consolidated school district No. 70 will be able to attend school, whereas they have been without schooling during the winter of 1922. It is impossible for them to attend the present school in District No. 43.

Was presented to the County Board of this County, at a session of said Board held on the 11th day of July A. D. 1922, for the action of said Board thereon; and Whereas, it was thereupon ordered by said Board that a hearing should be had upon said petition at a session of said Board commencing on the 8th day of August A. D. 1922, at the County Auditor's office in the City of Warren in said County; and Whereas, it was further ordered in and by said order that notice of the time and place of such hearing be given by posting of notice of said hearing in three public places in each of the School Districts to be affected by said petition, and by serving upon the Clerk of each of said School Districts personally, a copy of said notice, at least ten days before the time appointed for such hearing, and by giving two weeks published notice thereof in the Warren Sheaf, a duly qualified newspaper printed and published at Warren in said County; and Whereas, at the said session of said Board commencing on said 8th day of August A. D. 1922, proof of the due publication, posting and service of said notice as therein directed and required more than ten days prior to said last named date, having been made and filed said petition was publicly read and considered by the Board, with everything which was said by said interested parties for or against granting the prayer of the petitioner and being satisfied from all the evidence produced at such hearing that the allegations of said petition are true and said Board being of opinion that the prayer of said petitioner should be granted, it is hereby ordered and determined, that the following described lands owned by him to-wit: E 1/4 of Section 25, Township 158, Range 50, be, and the same are hereby set off from said School District No. 43 and said lands hereby made a part of said last named School District for all purposes whatever.

A. D. 1922, proof of the due publication, posting and service of said notice as therein directed and required, more than ten days prior to said last named date, having been made and filed, said petition was publicly read and considered by the Board, with everything which was said by said interested parties for or against granting the prayer of the petitioner and being satisfied from all the evidence produced at such hearing that the allegations of said petition are true and said Board being of opinion that the prayer of said petitioner should be granted, it is hereby ordered and determined, that the following described lands owned by him to-wit: SW 1/4 Section 36 Township 158 Range 48, be, and the same are hereby set off from School District No. 22 to said School District No. 70 and said lands are hereby made a part of said last named School District for all purposes whatever.

Whereas, a petition purporting to be signed by a majority of the freeholders who are qualified to vote at school meetings in each of the School Districts numbered 55 of the County of Marshall, State of Minnesota, asking that the said School District be enlarged and the boundaries of the said School District be changed by adding thereto the N 1/4 NW 1/4, SW 1/4 NW 1/4, SE 1/4 SW 1/4, NW 1/4 SE 1/4, NE 1/4 NW 1/4, NE 1/4 SE 1/4, Section 35, NE 1/4 SW 1/4, Section 36, all in Township 158 Range 47, was presented to the County Board of said County at a session thereof held on the 11th day of July A. D. 1922; and Whereas, it was thereupon ordered by said Board that a hearing should be had upon said petition at a session of said Board commencing on the 8th day of Aug. 1922, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon in the office of the County Auditor in the Court House in the City of Warren in said County, and said petition having come on to be heard at a session of said Board held at the time and place last above mentioned, was publicly read and considered, and the Board having heard the evidence in support of and in opposition to such petition and the arguments of all persons interested for or against the same, and as follows:

1st. That said petition is signed by a majority of all the freeholders who are qualified to vote at school meetings in each of the School Districts affected by said petition.

2nd. That notice of the time and place, when and where the Board would meet to hear said petition has been given and service thereof made by mailing copies of such notice to the Clerk of each of such School Districts, more than ten days prior to the day of such hearing, and by posting copies of such notice in each of three of the most public places in each of such School Districts so affected, more than ten days prior to said day of hearing, and by the publication of such notice once in each week for two successive weeks in the Warren Sheaf, a duly qualified newspaper printed and published in said County.

3rd. That proof of such service has been made and filed in the office of the County Auditor, by the certificate of the County Auditor, who mailed such notice to the Clerks of such Districts, and by the affidavit of Fred Peterson, who posted copies of such notice in each of said school districts, and by the affidavit of A. E. Mattson, who is the printer and publisher of said newspaper.

Wherefore, it is ordered and determined that said petition be granted and that School District No. 55 in said Marshall County be enlarged and said District be changed by adding thereto the N 1/4 NW 1/4, SW 1/4 NW 1/4, SE 1/4 Section 25, and SW 1/4 NE 1/4, NE 1/4 SE 1/4, Section 35, NE 1/4 SW 1/4, Section 36, all in Township 158 Range 47.
