Section 1. It is hereby made the duty of the Inspector of Buildings of the city of St. Paul to supervise: inspect and control each, every and all buildings or structures of every name, nature and kind now built and standing in the city of St. Paul or that shall hereafter be built therein.

Sec. 2. Whenever in the opinion of said Inspector of Buildings any build-

said Inspector of Buildings any build-ing or structure heretofore built and now standing or that shall hereafter be built within the limits of the city of St. Paul for any cause whatsoever appear to be in a condition which is detrimental to the safety or health of any person, or to the security of property within said city, or for the proper conducting of the water from off the roof thereof to the ground, sewer or gutter along the side of the same in such a manner as shall fully protect the walls or sides of said fully protect the walls or sides of said building or structure, also the founda-tion thereto, from all damages by reason upon the ground or into the sewer or gutter along the side thereof, he shall cause notice to be given to the owner of said buildings, if within the city, if not then to the agent or person having charge of said building or structure, of the existence of such defect and request such owner, agent or person having charge of the same to forthwith repair and put the same in good order and con-dition for the safety and health of all

persons and the security of property.

All water pipes, conductors, or leaders of water running from off the roof of all such buildings or structures shall be so built and put up as to in no case discharge the water therefrom, upon, over or along any sidewalk or other public walk along said building, but the same shall be discharged underneath the same into drain pipes leading to the gutter or sewer, and in such a manner as not to cause the same to be or to become dancause the same to be or to become dar gerous to travel over and along such sidewalk or other public walk. In all cases where the water pipes, conductors or leaders of water above

mentioned do not conform to the above mentioned do not conform to the above and foregoing provisions in relation to the same, a similar and like notice and request shall be given to the owner, agent or person having charge thereof, as hereinabove provided in this section.

Sec. 3. The Inspector of Buildings is hereby fully empowered and authorized to inspect all skylights upon. all buildings is the control of the co to inspect all skylights upon all build-ings within the limits of the city, also all foundations or foundation walls, and also all openings into or through any wall or any building or structure in this city, and if, upon such inspection, the same, or either of them, shall in any point, respect or particular prove to be

point, respect or particular prove to be defective, insecure or deficient, he shall give a similar or like notice and request of such defect, insecure or deficient part or portion, specifying the same to the owner, agent or person having charge of said building or structure as is specified and provided in section two of this ordinance.

cepted), after receiving notice as herein above provided to perfect and put in re-pair such defective, insecure or danger-ous building or structure as mentioned in the Inspector of Buildings' notice. shall upon conviction thereof, before the municipal court of this city be fined in a sum not less than ten (10) dollars, or more than fifty (50) dollars, besides being liable to a like action for such neglect and refusal daily during the time of such neglect or refusal to comply with said notice of said Inspector of Buildidgs.
