Coast Trains Will All Go Out in Sev eral Sections-Most of the Travelers Bona Fide Settlers.

For the first real day in the homeseek ers' and settlers' rush west, yesterday was a record-breaker. As near as can be estimated, about 2,000 people passed through St. Paul yesterday en route for

The roads from the East and South brought in many passengers, the Great Western probably taking the lead. To carry the household effects of the set-tlers the road brough 100 freight cars, loaded to their utmost capacity. T bespeaks the fact that these are be This fide settlers, while in many cases the passengers are simply homeseekers, that is, people who have bought homeseekers' round-trip tickets, and are going west to look over the country. The Great Western's business came largely from Nebraska, but the North-Western, Milwaukee, Wisconsin Central, Minneapolis & St. Louis and Burling-ton all brought large contingents. The

coast trains were all crowded.

The Great Northern train went out in two sections, the first having twelve coaches and the second having seven. The Northern Pacific also found it necessary to put on extra equipment, and that train hauled thirteen coaches. The trayel was almost equally heavy on the night trains, many tourists coming in during the day. Today will probably be far ahead of yesterday in the mat-ter of numbers, and it is expected that

FIRST EVER RUN BETWEEN HERE AND CHICAGO.

This morning three tourist sleeners will come into St. Paul from Chicago. They will be attached to the limited trains of the Omaha, Milwaukee and Great Western roads and will be the first tourist sleepers ever run between here and Chicago. They will be taken back on the limited trains tonight and travelers can secure berths to Chicago from now on, Wednesdays and Fridays, for \$1.

While nothing definite in regard to the travel on the tourist cars has been heard at the local offices, still there have been many little indications that the travel will be quite heavy on them. The roads that have put them on no longer express any doubt as to the advisability of running the \$1 a berth car, and it is doubtful if they will be taken off at the end of two months as was the original intention.

The action of the Chicago & North-Western in withdrawing from all the freight organizations with which it was associated is causing no little comment among freight officials of other roads.

It is well known that the freight officials of the Harriman lines do not approve of these alliances. The North-Western gives no reason for pulling out except that it has become dissatisfied with the working of the organization.

The recent activity of the interstate commerce commission may have had something to do with the action, and it is expected that a number of the big Western roads will follow the example of the North-Western.

CANNOT ENTER CINCINNATI.

Supreme Court Upholds Lower Tribunal in Street Railway Case.

COLUMBUS. Ohio, March 4.—The supreme court in affirming the judgment of the circuit court of Hamilton county in the case of the Cincinnati & Cleveland Railroad company against the city of Cincinnati, today held that the company which was organized for the purpose of building an electric railway from Cleveland to Cincinnati cannot enter the latter city. The position taken by the lower courts was that property cannot legally be condemned for street railway purposes.
