BUSINESS OUTLOOK IS MOSTLY BRIGHT

Steady Market for Butcher Cat- Only Drawback Is Irregular Re tail Distribution, Due to Freak Weather

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—R. G. Dunn & Co.'s weekly review of trade tomorrow will say: Erratic weather produces irregularity in retail, distribution of merchandise at many points and Southern business is quiet because of the depression in cotton, but the general outlook is considered very bright. Manufacturers report that confidence is warranted by the number of new orders, while deliveries on old contracts are of satisfactory volume. The best news comes from the iron and steel industry, while footwear factories are busy, woolen mills in exceptionally good condition and activity is assured among cotton spinners as soon as the raw material market becomes settled. Failures for January thus far compare very favorably with last year's returns. Railway earnings increased % percent over those of 1904 and foreign commerce at this port for the last week shows a gain of \$6,151,867 in imports and a loss of only \$581,333 in exports.

Although business is distributed somewhat irregularly, owing to local conditions as to supply of fuel and other materials the iron and steel industry is moving steadily forward. Statistics of pig iron production and consumption at the opening of the year testify to even greater prosperity than was anticipated. Nor is stability threatened by speculative inflation of prices as yet, although that is a dai er that usually menaces any revival of it. Ustrial activity. Coke ovens in the Connelsville region are producing at maximum capacity, and there is no handicap to progress in Pittsburg, but storms and strikes still affect fuel supply at some other points. Railways are placing large contracts for all forms of equipment, and the demand for billets and bers is so urgent that premiums above list prices are recorded on some transactions. Thus far the new year has not brought the anticipated demand for leather, but tanners are confident that the activity will not be long delayed. Prices are fairly steady.

ARGUES FOR TREATIES OF ARBITRATION

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 13.-The senate today made public the letter of the president to the senate regarding the arbitration treaties sent to the senate Dec. 13, 1904. The president says: "These conventions do not go so far as

"These conventions do not go so far as I could wish in scope and effect, but taken together, they form a very important step in the progress of the world towards a policy of peaceful solution of such differences as cannot conveniently be settled by diplomatic negotiations. The very limitations which seem objectionable to many advocates of a policy of arbitration are not without compensating advantages. They commit none of the contracting parties to any action in opposition to their national interests or policies. Their principal value is that they constitute a considerable advance in the purposes so ardently desired—of the reign of universal peace and good will. No discrimination has been made among the powers signatory to The Hague convention who have desired to enter into these friendly relations and it would be undesirable from the standpoint of what this government is striving to accomplish to make any such discrimination. I should not willingly exchange retifications will make any such discrimination. I should not willingly exchange ratifications with any of the powers unless the series of con-ventions as a whole should meet with the force his consideration of the senate." ventions as a whole should meet, with the favorable consideration of the senate."

The senate today ratified an arbitration treaty for pecuniary claims which was signed at the second conference of American states at Mexico City Jan. 30, 1992. It provides for the submission of claims not settled by diplomacy to The Hague, unless both parties prefer that a special jurisdiction be organized. The treaty is to be in force five years. The countries signing are: Bolivia. Colombia.
