"There is only one way that we know of to prevent deaths from corn stalk disease," says the Live Stock Indicator, "and that is to keep the cattle out of the corn stalks. Shocked corn does not cause the disease, and if owners of cattle will cut up their corn instead of leaving the stalks stand they will not only get a vastly larger amount of feed per acre from a corn field, but they will be able to feed it with safety to the animals, a thing that they cannot do with any certainty so long as the cattle are fed on the stalks in the field."

## Newspaper Textbooks.

The superintendent of the state normal school of Maryland and the superintendent of the schools of Baltimore are enlisted in the work of utilizing newspapers for the instruction of pupils. Their plan is not only to keep pupils acquainted with the important news of the day, but to instruct advanced pupils in current events by one or more lectures a week.

There are several textbooks in the schools, some of them quite high priced, as well as ornamental, which are far less profitable to scholars than a well conducted newspaper would be. As the Baltimore Sun suggests in this connection, there is an unusual amount of history in the daily papers, such, for instance, as the rise of the Cuban republic, the Boer war, the operations in the Philippines, the relations between Argentina and Chile, the trouble between Germany and Venezuela, the internal troubles in Venezuela, the latest development in wireless telegraphy and aerial navigation, the Isthmian canal, the Pan-American convention in Mexico, the great trade invasion of Europe, and other subjects of general interest.

How many school children have the slightest knowledge of these events of a world nature? As for that, how many teachers are capable of instructing their scholars intelligently about them? This is not the teachers' fault, for their time is occupied, not alone with the fundamental and necessary studies with which they are acquainted, but with ornamental and unnecessary studies of which they know little or nothing.

From the practical point of view this newspaper history is of infinitely more importance than music taught without ears and cows with green ears and blue milk-painted without eyes. It may be of more importance than the history of remote and extinct nations. History is making daily and can be learned easily by day. It is not necessary to wait for years until the historians shall have compiled their ponderous and often inaccurate volumes.
