

Of Interest to the Farm Boy.

The farm boy is at last coming in for his share of attention by those who are interested in the future agriculture of the State. At the annual "Farmers Week" meetings which will be held at Columbia, January 7th to 10th, and at which the corn growers of the state, the livestock breeders and the dairymen hold their meetings, a special series of entertainment has been arranged for the farm boys, a large number of whom are expected to come with their fathers or friends.

This special entertainment is in the nature of a short course in agriculture and will include practice in corn judging and scoring, stock judging, and dairy work. The plan is to place the boys in charge of competent instructors on these subjects, and to fill the four days of the course, January 7th to 10th, full of those things that are of most interest and help to the boy who is to be a farmer. All boys under sixteen years of age are invited to attend. The older boys will find as much to interest them in the regular program of "Farmers' Week." There are no fees, no special requirements. All are welcome.

The State Corn Show, which will be held at the same time, is the largest event of the Mississippi River and special feature this year is a Boy's Corn Growing Contest in which corn grown by several hundred of these contestants will compete for prizes. The boys of Missouri will therefore have a large share of the attention at "Farmers' Week" this year.

Watch parties were held at half a dozen different places in town New Year's eve, the Presbyterians holding fourth at Add Joyce's home, the Methodists with N. A. Mackey, and a high school crowd at the Jas. Bowers home. The customary merrymaking ushered in the new year, the bells at the church were made to herald its arrival, such to the disgust of the slumberously inclined native, and the usual red, sleepy eyes were in evidence next day.
