

#### DEATH OF J. B. SCHOTT.

#### Complication of Diseases Fatal to Retired Farmer.

J. B. Schott, a retired farmer, who resided at the corner of Tenth st. and Prospect ave. Carthage, died Thursday of a complication of diseases. He had been in poor health several years and had been under the care of a physician for nine months. He was 65 years old.

Mr. Schott had resided in Carthage about four years, moving there from his farm near Jasper. He had lived in this county about 25 years. Before coming here he made his home in Nebraska.

The members of his family who survive are the widow and a son, A. W. Schott, who resides on a farm near Jasper. Six grandchildren also survive.

Mr. Schott had been married three times. The surviving wife was formerly Mrs. Nora Lyngar, a daughter of S. B. Lawson of Jasper. She and Mr. Schott had been married a little more than four years.

A short funeral service was conducted at the Schott home at 1 o'clock this afternoon. D. W. Teeter

of Jasper having charge of the rites immediately after the close of the services the family started with the body for Jasper. From there it was sent to Crown, Iowa, for burial.

Mr. Schott's will has been filed for probate. By its terms, half of the estate goes to Nora B. Schott, widow of the deceased, for her to enjoy during her life time. One-fourth goes to Albert W. Schott, son of the deceased, and the remaining quarter goes to the three children of Carrie M. Wood, daughter of the deceased, who is dead.

When the widow, Nora B. Schott, dies, her share of the estate is to be divided into two equal parts, one going to Albert W. Schott, and the other share going to the three children of Carrie M. Wood.

Albert W. Schott is named as executor, to serve without bond. The will was written January 3 last, with Omer Webb and Homer Beyne as witnesses.
