

Romped Over St. Joseph

The Oregon high school champions romped over St. Joseph high school Saturday afternoon, October 26. Outweighing them 20 pounds to the man, with the additional advantage of years of grinding practice, the Holt county boys won out the first time. The final score was 46 to 6, but St. Joseph did not give in without a heart-breaking fight. They held the Oregon lads fairly well in the first half, but staved, and the superior weight of their adversaries told. Motter and DeClue were St. Joseph's stars.

Oregon won the toss and chose the north goal. Left Tackle Rayhill kicked off to St. Joseph's 25 yard line, the ball remaining in the latter's territory throughout the entire game. The visitors made down but one time which was done by a quarterback kick. The game was played in 30 minute halves, the score at the close of the first half being 28 to 0, in the Oregon's favor.

Captain Rayhill blocked a fine play of the visitors. They attempted a punt while on their five yard line, when he broke in and sent Right Tackle Stevenson through the line for the first touchdown. The longest running gain was made by left end, F. Hamm, who covered 85 yards. He also made three touchdowns and kicked two goals.

"Hurricane" Kahn had a chance to "try out" every one of his substitutes in this game. This is the third one played by Oregon this season, winning them all.
