The above facsimile of the registration card, is to be filled out for every man of military age soon after Congress perfects the selective conscription law, shows how qualifications, exemption claims and other facts are tabulated in concise form. On the reverse of the registration card is space for additional particulars as to physical qualifications to be filled in by the authorities.
