A conference of President Harkness, of Kansas City; Secretary Wennecker, of the State League; Chairman Filley and Secretary Griffin, of the state committee, was held at the state Republican headquarters on Dec. 23. Reports were received and read from the executive committee with following result:

Pursuant to the constitution of the Missouri League of the state of Missouri, Sec. vi., the time and place of holding the biennial convention of the League, if not provided for by previous convention, is left to the executive committee. The place having been provided—Chillicothe—and the time left to the executive committee, it has been, after consultation with the full committee and without a dissenting voice, agreed to name a date after the holding of the Republican national convention as the proper time to hold it; and, as sentiment seems to be unanimous, make it a ratification meeting of the action of the state and national conventions. Therefore, the commencement is made, after full consultation, that so soon as the state and national conventions have been officially called, a meeting of the executive committee will be convened to name the time.
