The United States statisticians find the number of chickens to be over \$0,000,000 valued at \$85,000,000. One of the striking and admirable pecularities of the humble hen is the enormous output on the comparatively meager capitalization; there is no watered stock. The \$55,000,coo worth of working hous yield annually chickens for the market which sells for \$137,000,000, in addition to \$144,000,000 worth of eggs. The bens lay angually 1,250,-000,000 dozen eggs. In the value of eggs sold the state of Ohlo leads, Willard Cox, Sigourney, Iowa, on while Iows carries the banner in the number of eggs actually produced. In the census year Alaske had only 179 chickens. The government tells us that the price of eggs is only a trifle over 11 cents a dezen.
