

Close Watch Is Kept Over Bucket Shops

New York, March 16.—The precautions that the governors of the New York Stock Exchange are taking to keep their own house clean were revealed today by an exchange member, who declared that it was practically impossible for a crooked dealer to remain in business there without being caught.

"In the first place, the hazards are too great," this member explained. "An exchange seat sells for about \$150,000, and no one but the biggest kind of gambler would jeopardize that seat by shady transactions."

"Eyes on Transactions" "In the second place, the governors maintain a squad of investigators, who keep their eyes on any man whose transactions may become suspicious. These detectives—for that is what they are—watch that man's trading on the floor, keep an ear open at the telephones that he uses and maintain a general surveillance over everything within the Exchange walls."

"One firm, now under suspicion, was watched for several weeks recently until it was discovered that its transactions were passing beyond the border line." It is the men and women of very small means in New York City and a number of other centers who have contributed the \$25,000,000 that it is estimated has been lost through the bucketshops of Wall Street within the past two months.

How Bucketshops Work The bucketshop permits its customer to trade in small lots on as low as a one point margin. As long as the market is fairly firm, with fluctuations of only a point or so a day either way, the bucketshop can remain in business—and fleece its customers.

But when the market begins to rise, it was stated, then the bucketshop falls with a smash that carries everything with it. It is an established fact that no legitimate broker who actually purchases orders consigned to him can go broke. It is the man who buckets the orders of his customers who is caught when the market rises. And the market has been gradually rising within the past eight or ten weeks. That mainly accounts for the gigantic failures in Wall Street bucketshops in that time, the expert declared.

Jazz Immoral? Some Answer Yes, Some No

Chicago, March 16.—Jazz music—is it immoral? Chicago musicians—artists all—are divided on this question, which has thrust itself to the front as the result of the scathing condemnation from Judge Arnold Heap, of the morals court, and superintendent of schools Peter A. Mortenson. Judge Heap, finding a young woman \$200 for the manner in which she danced to jazz music, described it as "primitive sensuality." Superintendent Mortenson pleaded with the high-school girls of the city to give up dancing to jazz music "which is breaking down respect for womanhood."

But why denounce the zippy melody? Musicians want to know it may be inartistic, some say, but it certainly is not "immoral." What Pianist Says Says Molsay Boguslawski, famous Russian pianist: "Anyone who condemns jazz immoral must have an absence mind. Music is the language of the soul. It appeals to the divine. There can be nothing base or immoral when it is played sincerely. Any interpretation put upon modern music rests only with the individual. I blame the dancers, not the music."


Fanny Bloomfield Ziesler, well-known musician said: "Jazz music for the most part is coarse and ugly, but not immoral. I am not crazy about it moral. I am not crazy about it music would rise. But this is a nervous age."

Max Fleck, head of the normal department of the Chicago Musical College, said: "It is largely a question of mind and environment. Jazz makes you feel good. But it is not immoral. It is what you make it. The most beautiful waltz ever composed can be danced immorally."

Synopsed Church Music The public is calling everything "jazz" that is synopsed, according to Carl B. Stein, president of the Auditorium Musical Dramatic Conservatory. "Yet, he said, you can hear synopsed music in church."

Peking.—General Wu Pei-Fu, Inspector general of government troops in Hunan and Hupeh, reported to be moving large bodies of troops by way of Lungshai railway, cutting communications of General Chang Tso-Lin, governor of Manchuria and gaining control of strategic rail centers.

Canadian Wheat Growers Request Government Aid

Ottawa, March 16.—Declaring that farmers of western Canada face continued financial stringency unless the government acts in their behalf, a special delegation to the Canadian council of agriculture today asked the Dominion government to reinstate the Canadian wheat board, "for the handling of the 1922 wheat crop, and until such times as world conditions again become normal."

The petition declared that after the Canadian harvest, the bulk of the wheat is thrown on the market from September 1 to early in December "because almost every financially interested collection agency is employed to force the farmer to sell."
