New Pension Law.
 UNDER an act of Congress approved March 3,
 1874, widows of officers who were killed, or
 died of disease contracted in the service, are now
 entitled to \$2.00 per month for each of their chil-
 dren.
 The guardian of a minor child of a soldier who
 bore arms only received \$3.00 per month pension
 is now entitled to \$10. per month.
 Soldiers who receive invalid pensions can now
 have their pensions increased to any sum or rate
 between \$8. and \$15. per month.
 Soldiers who have lost their discharges can now
 obtain duplicates.
 Fathers and mothers who lost sons in the service
 upon whom they were dependent for support,
 can also obtain pensions.
