The Horton Case.

The evidence on the part of the prosecution in the Horton case, now on trial in St. Paul. was closed last Saturday afternoon, The points es tablished are summed up by the Minneapolis Tribune as follows:

Horton's wife, before marriage, was a domestic, and was 32 years old when he married her. Horton was 21 years old. He deserted her in 1882 on a claim in Dakota, leaving her in destitute circumstances. They reunited again one year afterwards. He deserted her again in 1886, saying that he would not live with her again, but did on one or two occasions.

At one time in the early part of 1890 he visited her, remaining over night. At this time he charged her with adultery and tried to force her to admit it, which she refused to do. After this he did not see her or correspond with her until July 15, 1890, when he sent her a telegram and wrote letters asking her to meet him at Winona He failed to keep this appointment and telegraphed her once or twice saying he would go and see her, but failed to do so. On July 27 he telegraphed her again he would meet her at Trempealeau, Wis., in the morning, that day being Sunday. She waited there for him until 1 o'clock, and as he failed to appear, she went to one of the neighbors. At about 2:30 o'clock of that day he appeared at her house and inquired for her, and finding her out, told her brother that he had come to make some settlement and obtain a divorce; that he would not live with her again. He stated at that time that she had committed adultery with one B. H. Englund. This she denied as soon as her brother told her what Herton said.



Tuesday Dec. 9.—In the house Representative-elect Thomas J. Gary, of California, was sworn in. The resolution looking to the removal of the remains of Gen.
