People's Party Pokes Fun at Trustee Perrine's Freak Ordinance.

HOT BATTLE AT POLLS EXPECTED TOMORROW

Citizens' Party Candidates Will Have Help of Union Faction.

Local politics are today sizzling hot in South Orange village over the election of three village trustees tomorrow. The administration, or Citizens' party, with Patrick Kernan, Robert M. Miles, Jr., and Frank E. Hagemeyer as candidates, is opposing the People's party whose candidates are Louis F. Blanchet, John R. Weeks and Henry B. Halsey. The Union ticket, with the three men named by the Citizens' party, will also be in the field. The People's organization today issued circulars on which were cartoons. One was "The Latest Folly." It ridiculed the "muzzling" of cats, roosters and other animals as peace disturbers. This was hitting at the Citizens' because of the ordinance which was introduced by Village Trustee Howland D. Perrine at the last meeting of the Board of Trustees. In its platform the People's organization condemns the part taken in the election by employees of the village. J. Frank Gaudiner and William B. Self, members of the People's executive committee, who said they were representing the People's candidates, visited the Village Hall officials and asked them "not to get out and work at the polls tomorrow" and assured them that their jobs would not be effected in the event of the People's party being victorious. Water Superintendent Nolan says he was told by Daniel Decker, treasurer of the People's party, that the statement made by Gaudiner was unauthorized.

FATAL OUTBREAK OF SCARLET FEVER IN PUBLIC SCHOOL

Hazel E. Albinson, of Bloomfield, First Victim—Building May Be Closed.

Owing to an outbreak of scarlet fever in the Berkeley public school, Bloomfield, which resulted in the death of Hazel E. Albinson, 7 years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas H. Albinson, of Hill street, that town, the school may be closed and fumigated. There are over fifteen pupils in the school who are ill.

Peloubet, of 172 Arlington avenue, north, East Orange, who died Saturday of heart trouble, will take place Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock at Mrs. Peloubet's home. Further services will be held at the Mechanicsville M. E. Church on Thursday. The interment will be in the West Long Branch Cemetery. Mrs. Wardell was 70 years old, and is survived by several children and two grandchildren.
