## BRANEGAN SAYS RIVAL DECDED TO FOIL JUDGMENT

### Winner of Alienation Verdict Wants Slingerland's Hotel Conveyance Set Aside.

Another legal twist has been taken as the outcome of the sensational suit for alienation of affections brought by Christopher Branegan against Frederick Slingerland and the Court of Chancery will now be asked to decide whether Slingerland's \$50,000 hotel property in Asbury Park was conveyed to his father, William Slingerland, for the express purpose of evading judgment in case the suit went against him.

The suit did go against him to the extent of \$3,000, to which the Supreme Court at Trenton had cut down a verdict of \$7,000 the other day. That verdict had been reached by a jury before the local Circuit Court, presided over by Judge Adams, but there was an appeal, with the result named, and Mr. Branegan was told that unless he accepted \$3,000 he would have to begin all over again.

His wife, Mrs. Winifred Branegan, whose maiden name was Poole, was the cause of the trouble, and the testimony taken at the trial convinced the jury that the husband was the aggrieved party and should be compensated.

Visited by Mrs. Branegan, Slingerland was caught in New York city and afterwards brought here. While in the metropolis Mrs. Branegan visited him, she admitted, and also admitted that she wore a locket with his picture in it. This was one of the exhibits at the trial.

Mr. Branegan, who is a brother of Police Judge Joseph Branegan of Harrison, now sets up, through Louis J. Beera, his counsel, that he cannot collect the judgment because Slingerland has transferred the hotel property. This, he says, was done long after the cause arose "with the intention of defeating any claim for recovery." No consideration, it is alleged further, is named in the deed to the father. Slingerland's hotel is known as "The Rutherford" and is in Park avenue.

## OFFICIAL WOULD HAVE CUBS MOVE BALL PARK FROM HOSPITAL ZONE.

CHICAGO, May 12.—There is trouble ahead for the management of the Chicago National League Ball Club if County Commissioner Charles Glennon succeeds in gaining favorable action on a move which he started yesterday to have the West Side ball park moved farther away from the county hospital. The county is now preparing to make additions to the hospital which will cost more than \$3,000,000, and Commissioner Glennon says he wants to make conditions around the institution as perfect as possible.

"I want it to be understood that I am not doing this in opposition to the management of the Cubs or that I am in any way opposed to baseball," said Glennon. "I am a fan myself and am anxious to see the game prosper in Chicago. But I believe that the vicinity in which a hospital is located should be a zone of quiet."

## NO PRINCETON OFFER SAYS DR. DAVID HILL.

NEW YORK, May 12.—Dr. David Jayne Hill, ambassador to Germany, who called yesterday by the Hamburg-American liner Amerika, boarded her looking in fine physical condition. He said that the physical controversy had had nothing whatever to do with his resignation.

He had not received, he said, any invitation to become the president of Princeton University. He will not return for some time.

## LOVING CUP BESTOWED ON WILLIAM O. KUEBLER.

Standard Bearer of Kueblers Honored at Banquet.

A handsome silver loving cup was presented to William O. Kuebler, standard-bearer of the William O. Kuebler Association, when that body gathered in Krueger Auditorium last night for its second annual banquet.

Judge William H. Spear, of Hudson county, was introduced by Townsman Kuebler. The former told how legislation is often enacted for private gain and the public not considered.
