Success refrigerators are constructed entirely of galvanized steel within and without. The walls are lined with four layers of heavy waterproof sheathing paper and two layers of sanitary quilt, with an air space of three-fourths of an inch all around. Bottom, top and doors are of the same construction. All joints are

soldered air and water tight before enameling. This is without doubt the most perfect insulation known in a refrigerator. All doors close into rubber strips and are practically air tight.

INSIDE FINISH

The inside finish is white enamel, laid on in four coats and each coat baked on separately. This means time, labor and expense, but Success refrigerators are made to last and be clean—and they will last and they are clean. The inside finish is white, pure and free from odor.

OUTSIDE FINISH

The outside is finished in aluminum, giving the refrigerators a very clean and attractive appearance.

FITTINGS

All hinges and locks are of solid brass. All lettering is in gilt and colors. Casters are of steel with ball bearings, thus securing durability with strength and ease of movement.

ICE CHAMBER

The construction of the ice chamber is one of the most important points about a refrigerator. In the Success all the protective walls are of heavy galvanized steel, reinforced and corrugated to secure the greatest strength. The ice rack is of similar construction. All these parts are removable, a most important consideration for cleanliness.

SHELVING

The shelves are made of heavy woven wire, electric welded, tinned with pure block tin, and will not rust. This insures a perfect circulation, and are easily kept clean and sanitary.

DRIP PIPE

The drip pipe is easily removable and is fitted with a water trap at the top to prevent escape of cold air. It is made of heavy galvanized steel.

AIR CIRCULATION

The circulation of air is one of the important features of refrigeration. In the Success it is perfect. The construction is such that the air is kept constantly in circulation up to and over the ice and down through the food compartments. Thus the latter are kept bone dry, all moisture condensing on the ice, and the temperature is held at an even point throughout the food spaces.

Perfect refrigeration is more important to-day than it ever was heretofore. The modern methods of keeping food products in cold storage, sometimes for years, makes it imperative that these foods shall be kept cold, dry and clean until consumed. The importance of this cannot be too strongly stated.
