Extracts from the U.S. War Tax Law of 1914 Effective Dec. 1, 1914, to Jan. 1, 1916

DEEDS AND CONVEYANCES

Deed, instrument, or writing, whereby any lands, tenements, or other realty sold shall be granted, assigned, transferred, or otherwise conveyed to, or vested in, the purchaser or any other person by his direction, when the consideration or value of the interest or property conveyed, exclusive of the value of any lien or encumbrance thereon, exceeds \$100.00 and does not exceed \$500.00, 50c; and for each additional \$500.00 or fractional part thereof in excess of \$500.00, 50c. Does not apply to any instrument or writing given to secure a debt (mortgages).

PROMISSORY NOTES

Promissory notes, except bank notes issued for circulation. and for each renewal of same, for the sum not exceeding \$100.00, 2c; and for each additional \$100.00 or fractional part thereof in excess of \$100.00, 2c.

PROTEST

Upon the protest of every note, bill of exchange, acceptance, check or draft, or any marine protest, 25c.

NOT to be RECORDED until STAMPED


Hereafter, no instrument required by law to be stamped shall be recorded until the proper stamps have been affixed.

UNLAWFUL to RECORD without STAMPS It is unlawful to record or register any instrument, required by law to be stamped, unless the proper stamps are affixed and cancelled.
