Happenings of Interest from Different Sections.

The average number of tickets sold at the Rutland race station is 1,500, but in 24 hours Sunday and Monday more than 5,000 were sold.

Miss Clara Gregg, for 45 years a bookmaker for the Bennington Paper Box company, resigned last week and will retire from active work.

Miss Cecilia Carrigan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Carrigan of Pittsford, and Thomas F. McGarry, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McGarry of Rutland, have just announced their marriage, which took place at the residence of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McGarry, in the city of New York, on Monday, June 28.

Richard Purdy of Woodford, an engineer, employed by the Westchester and Putnam railroad, was seriously injured Monday, when his motorcycle left the road and passed under a railing, the latter striking Mr. Purdy in the stomach. Machine and rider went down a 20-foot bank to another street. It is thought that his spleen or liver were ruptured, but he has suffered internal hemorrhages. He has been too low to operate on as yet. He is 28 years old and has a wife.

A decree of foreclosure involving first mortgage bonds of the Columbia Corporation, predecessors of the United Marble companies in Rutland, was handed down Tuesday morning by Judge Stanley C. Wilson of Chelsea. The Columbia corporation conducted the plant for some years. There are 28 persons, besides the corporation, named in the foreclosure petition.

Eight persons escaped death in an automobile accident in Middlebury when a seconded a miraculous manner July 5. A Hudson car, owned and driven by John Dyer of Middlebury, locked wheels with a Hummobile, driven by William Rogers. The Hummobile stopped almost instantly when struck, the other car, said to have been traveling very rapidly, went 50 feet and buried the forward end in a corn field. The forward wheel was broken and the spokes gouged a deep furrow in the soil as the machine traveled across it to the field. A boy was with Mr. Dyer in the Hudson and with Mr. Rogers were his mother and three children. No one was even scratched in the accident.

DAIRYING INTERESTS RUTHLESS.
Blooded Stock on the Increase in Vermont.

That the dairying industry of Vermont is in a healthy and growing condition is indicated by the results of a survey of the surplus registered cattle in the state recently completed by John A. Hitchcock, specialist in dairying of the extension service of the University of Vermont. Returns were received from 118 breeders and show offerings of approximately 900 animals belonging to the four leading dairy breeds. A wide range of prices is shown, some of the animals being backed by several generations of advanced registry or register of merit records. In keeping, however, with the fact that overwhelming majority of Vermont breeders of purebred cattle are practical dairymen rather than fanciers, the greater number of the cattle are at farmers' prices.

Of special interest is the fact that there are offered for sale several bulls whose daughters have been tested, the final measure of the worth of a sire. Lists of the animals for sale have been placed in the hands of the county agents for use in the "pure bred sires campaign" and are on file in the office of the extension service.
