Happenings of Interest from Different Sections

Plans for the improvement of the underpass at Waterbury are being considered by State Engineer George A. Reed, State Highway Commissioner T. W. Dix and District Highway Commissioner Earl Hyatt of Barre. It is possible that some steps will be taken to improve the underpass this year. Mr. Reed and Mr. Hyatt conferred Tuesday with Chief Engineer Fitzpatrick of the Central Vermont railway in regard to the underpass. The difficulties of the present underpass are the blind turn, lightness of the bridge in making a weight limit for trucks necessary, and the steel trestle carrying the bridge which takes up part of the space at the underpass.

RIVER TURNED ASIDE

Important Engineering Feat Performed at Whittingham

A visitor at the site of the New England Power company's proposed earth dam at Davis bridge, near Whittingham, related the story of how the historic Deerfield river was turned from its channel Sunday and sent through a 1,000-foot tunnel in the mountain side while the workers and others looked on with almost breathless interest.

Preparations had been under way several months, it being necessary to turn the river in order to leave the river bed dry for the construction of the dam, which is to be about 1,000 feet long and 200 feet high. When the first day came and the channel had been partially closed by dumping rocks and earth into the river a big force of men from the 700 or more employed on the project directed its energies toward quickly shutting the stream out of its bed of many centuries and forcing it into the tunnel.

Work trains with their loads of earth and rock ran back and forth from burrow pits and dumped their loads into the river, while hydraulic pressure helped distribute it where wanted. The channel gradually was closed until only a tiny trickling stream flowed over the top of the dam, then resident engineer, J. J. Baker, Jr., seized an empty cement bag, threw it into the tiny stream, and placed a rock upon it, and an important step in a gigantic enterprise which is to cost more than \$7,000,000, was accomplished.

The completion of the dam is many months away. While it is being built the river will flow through the tunnel, which is lined with cement and was built by the Rollins Construction company of Boston.
