The Nine-Hour System Goes Into Effect. The day for the adoption of the nine-hour system has brought forth no startling developments in labor circles. The men have gained their point in nearly every instance and have found the contractors ready and willing to submit to the new order of things.

But five laboring men were found on the street this morning who had quit work today because of their failure to gain their demands, and four of these could blame only themselves. The resolutions adopted by the mass meeting were to the effect that the men should work but nine hours a day, letting pay regulate itself.

Four of these men demanded ten hours' pay for nine hours' work, and the contractors would not grant it. The fifth was a painter in the employ of Fitzpatrick Brothers. The firm employ twenty men and the majority had signified their willingness to work ten hours a day.

This was the only one who objected and the firm were obliged to let him go rather than let him work with men who were working the regular time. All of the men have jobs for to-morrow and there will be no trouble from them.

In many instances the employees have not asked for a reduction and are working under the old system. The laboring men seem to be about evenly divided on the question. J. A. Tenney has partially conceded. He is working two sets of men; one under the nine-hour system and one under the ten. He was one of the contractors who was at first bitterly opposed to it.

J. M. Westall is working his men under the nine-hour system and says he will let pay be regulated as it always is—by the supply and demand. Of the plasterers, V. T. Belote and J. H. Eaton will work their men nine hours and pay the same wages as they have been doing under the ten-hour system, and W. E. Wolfe, who has not granted the request, thinks he will in a few days.
