SERVICES IN THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

THE DECORATIONS AND THE NEW ORGAN.

A Sermon Preached to the Occasion by the Reverend W. S. P. Bryan.

Services were held in the Presbyterian church yesterday morning for the first time since the repairs were begun. The new organ has been put up and the interior of the church handsomely frescoed. The general ground work of the decorations is of buff and the side walls are of terracotta. On the walls there is a bordering of bands of peacock blue, olive and gilt.

The organ, a description of which has already appeared, was played by Mr. F. L. Jacobs, and has a softness of tone that is exquisite. The congregation was delighted with the instrument. Rev. W. S. P. Bryan, the pastor, preached a large gathering, from the text: "Now therefore we are no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow-citizens with the saints, and of the household of God."

On the call for question, it was carried. So we are to have a fountain in front of our court house. On motion of Mr. S. V. Pickett, Esq., a committee of three, Messrs. T. J. Rickard, R. I. Barnwell and P. E. Braswell, were appointed to locate the fountain. The meeting then adjourned.

Commencement Exercises. RICHMOND, May 11, 1890. The annual commencement exercises of Vaughan academy were held Friday evening and reflected much credit on the efficient teacher, Miss H. McCampbell. The hall was more than adequately filled and the frequent rounds of applause showed that those present appreciated the efforts of the scholars.

Still Another Addition. The Battery Park hotel is to be made still larger. Architects are now engaged in planning for a 150 room addition, to be built over the rear part of the building. The cost of the work will be forty or fifty thousand dollars.
