## Caroline Chatfield Says

### DEAR MISS CHATFIELD:

My husband earns \$200 a month. I earn \$60 a month, out of which I pay for my clothes and the baby's rent and extras of a small sort. At the end of the month my husband has hardly enough to pay the grocery bill. What he does with his money is a puzzle to me and to him, too. With the exception of rather frequent fishing trips he does nothing that requires much cash. His money just evaporates. Sometimes I think I have made a mistake in continuing to work, but it has seemed necessary. I want somebody's opinion on our case. Please give yours.

### ANSWER:

Well managed, your husband's salary alone is ample to support a family of three in comfort, with a few fishing trips thrown in for fun. One of two things you should do and quickly; either persuade him to let you handle the family funds or insist on a budget with strict accounts kept which will show where either of you is overspending.

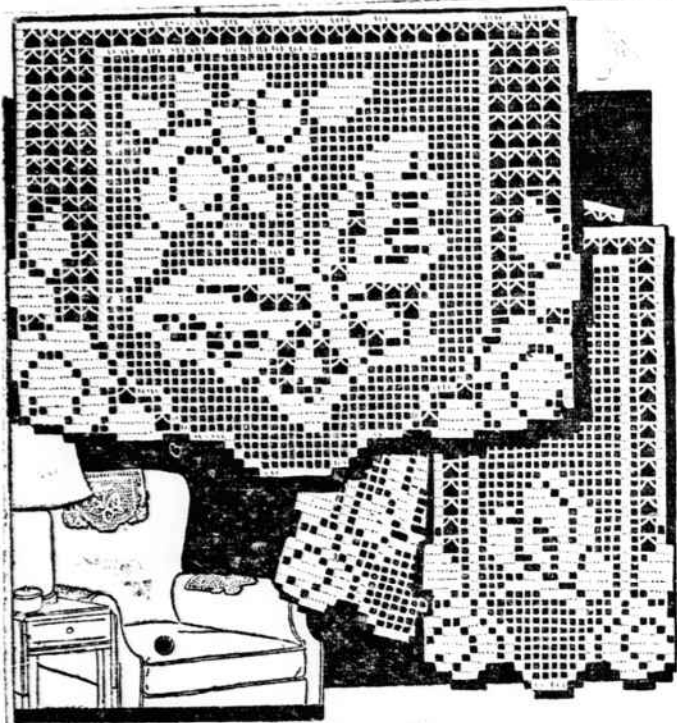
