

### HENDERSON CO. REPUBLICANS CONVENTION ON MAY 11

A convention of the Republicans of Henderson county is hereby called to meet in the court house in Hendersonville at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, on Saturday, May 11, 1918, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the various county offices to be elected next fall, and also to name a candidate to represent the county in the next legislature, and to transact any other business that may properly come before the convention.

It is suggested that precinct meetings to elect delegates to the county convention, be held at 2 o'clock p. m., on Friday, May 10. This is merely a suggestion however, and precinct chairmen can call precinct meetings for any date they may see fit. The chairman in each precinct is urged to issue a call in ample time for a meeting of the Republicans of his precinct, and at such meeting elect such delegates and alternates to the county convention and each precinct committee in March will, at its meeting to select delegates to the county convention hereby called, elect three good men as precinct committeemen to serve for the next two years.

The number of delegates to which each precinct is entitled, is as follows:

Bat Cave, 3; Bowman's Bluff, 3; Blue Ridge, 5; Clear Creek, 3; Crab Creek, 4; Edneyville, 4; Etowah, 3; E. Hendersonville, 7; Flat Rock, 5; Green River, 6; Hooper's Creek, 7; Horse Shoe, 2; Mills River, 4; Raven Rock, 4; Rugby, 1; Upward, 7; W. Hendersonville, 11.

All Republicans are urged to attend their precinct meetings, and assist in the selection of good men as delegates to the county convention, and in the transaction of any other business that may come up for consideration.

This call is made this 9th day of April, 1918, by order of the Republican Executive Committee of the county, and pursuant to a resolution passed by the Republican county convention held on March 30.
