## WAKE COUNTY NEWS.

Mr. Howard C. Thomas, eldest son of Capt. J. J. Thomas, of Raleigh, died Monday morning of heart failure. He had been ill only a few days.

Prof. J. C. Kendall, assistant professor of dairy husbandry in the North Carolina Agricultural and Mechanical College, at Raleigh, has been appointed state dairy commissioner for Kansas.

There was a large number of drunks before his honor the Police Judge Monday morning. In all the number of fines amounted to \$37.10. In one sense of the word it would appear that the Raleigh dispensary pays, but it does not pay the poor devil that gets tanked up.

Matthew Booker, a negro, brought to Raleigh Friday from Holly Springs township and placed in jail charged with stealing a bale of cotton from Henry Battle, a negro farmer, near Holly Springs. The cotton was recovered by tracing the tracks of a horse to a place in the woods five miles from where Battle lived. Battle declared the tracks were those of Booker's horse.

The Norris case came to an abrupt ending in Wake Superior Court Tuesday, when the N. C. Home agreed to pay the \$600 insurance claimed by Mrs. C. A. Norris for a house burned near Morrisville last fall. The insurance company was fighting against payment, claiming the house was burned by an agent of Mrs. Norris.

Mr. E. P. Baker, who has conducted a music store on Wilmington street for the past few years, has disappeared from the city, and a number of creditors are said to be looking for musical instruments that he sold. It is stated that some of the property he sold was mortgaged. If this is true the parties who bought said property will lose their money if it can be learned to whom the instruments were sold.

The first arrest under the "Jim Crow" street car act passed by the last legislature, was made in Raleigh Wednesday afternoon, when a white man by the name of W. W. Tucker (an ex-motorman and conductor) persisted in riding on the front platform. He was tried by the Police Justice and fined \$14.75. Under the provisions of the new law it is a misdemeanor to ride upon the front platform or on the running-board of the street cars.

George Mangum, a young man from near Falls of Neuse, Wake County, became insane while in Richmond a few days ago and began "preaching" on the streets. His brother Lonnie went to Richmond and brought him home. On arriving home Lonnie also became insane. An officer went for the two brothers to bring them to Raleigh. He tied them so they could give him no trouble on the way. But while George Mangum was being tied he told the officer no matter how he might blind him the Lord would help him to release himself. George did release his arms and escape.

Lonnie Mangum was placed in jail until room can be made for him at the asylum.

## FATAL SHOOTING AT McCULLERS.

Marshall Rowland Shot By Rowden Black.

Marshall Rowland, the eighteen-year old son of Mr. Bennett Rowland, of McCullers' station on the Raleigh and Southport Railroad and in Wake County, was shot and mortally wounded Sunday afternoon by Rowden Black, a sixteen year old boy. Black did not attempt to get away, and in a short time after the shooting was placed under arrest and committed to jail by Justice of the Peace J. E. Stevens. The physicians attending young Rowland say there is no hope whatever of his recovery.

The facts are reported as follows: Black met a younger brother of Marshall Rowland near the station at McCullers and asked him where he could get some whiskey. The boy replied he did not know, and it is said that his remark made Black angry resulting in Black slapping young Rowland. The boy went home and told his brother of the way Black had treated him, and Marshall Rowland went to the depot to see Black about it. When he arrived Black was sitting on the edge of a flat car and is said to have fired on Rowland without any provocation whatever, giving as his reason afterwards that Rowland approached him with his hands in his pockets and he thought he was preparing to shoot him for slapping his (Rowland's) brother. Black fired three times and two shots took effect, one entering the mouth and came out back of his ear and the other entered on the side of the neck and ranged towards the spinal column.

A deputy sheriff brought Black to Raleigh Sunday night and placed him in jail.

Marshall Rowland was brought to Raleigh Monday morning and carried to Rex Hospital. The young man is conscious but the lower part of his body is paralyzed, the second bullet having struck him on the spinal column.

Later—Marshall Rowland died at the hospital in Raleigh Monday night.

Alex McLean, Jr., Shoots Cleveland Adams in Panther Branch Township.

Cleveland Adams, the nineteen-year old son of Mr. Quint Adams, of Panther Branch township, Wake County, was shot three times Sunday afternoon by Alex McLean, Jr., the affair having occurred near Myatt's Mill.

The men got into a quarrel and McLean drew his pistol and began shooting. Three shots took effect in Adams' body but did not prove fatal. After McLean had emptied his revolver Adams is said to have jumped on him and beat him severely. McLean was placed under arrest.
