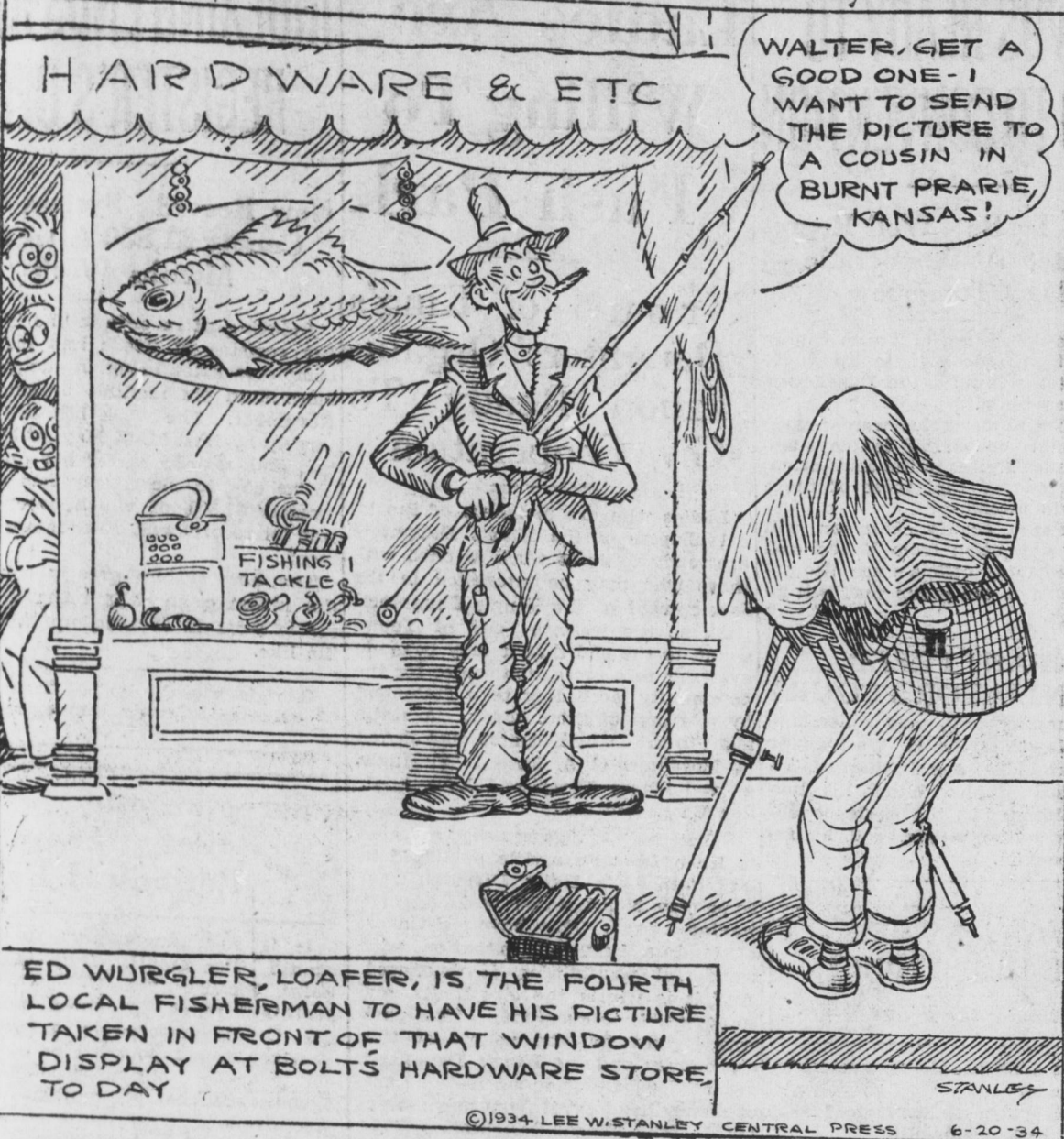

000 from the Federal government. The total amount of State funds used to pay teachers' salaries was hence \$12,034,723.73. The State would have paid the entire amount of \$12,034,723.73, however, even if it has not received the \$500,000 grant from the Emergency Relief Administration and all the teachers would have been paid in full. But if it had done that, it would not have been able to spend the \$800,000 it is now planning to spend on replacing old and worn out school buses, since it would have had to take what it had been counting on for bus replacement for salaries. The payroll for teachers is the State's largest payroll, since all the other 9,618 persons employed by the State, including all highway and prison employees, receive only \$7,640,000 a year in salaries.

lected for the post. The other is that the friends and supporters of Professor T. S. Johnson are reported to have launched a renewed drive to secure his appointment as administrative dean. The opposition of Commissioner Graham to Harrelson is not difficult for those who followed the course of affairs in the 1931 General Assembly to understand. In the first place, it is no secret here that Graham rather resented the establishment of the Department of Conservation and Development during the administration

of former Governor A. W. McLean and thought that the functions given to it should have been set up in his department. It is also understood that Graham, along with other elective State officers, did not like it when the post of director of the Conservation department was made appointive. It smacked too much of the short allot to suit them.

But the open break between Commissioner Graham and Colonel Harrelson came during the 1931 General Assembly when Harrelson was director of the Department of Conservation and Development and when a bill was introduced to consolidate this department with the Department of Agriculture, with an elective head. Commissioner Graham vigorously denied any knowledge of or responsibility for the bill.

bility for this bill. But it did not add to any feeling of friendliness between them. Another thing that did not help the situation was that Harrelson was decidedly friendly toward Governor O. Max Gardner, while Graham was not.

The new move reported as under way in behalf of Johnson for administrative dean at State College is regarded as emanating almost entirely from those on the faculty and among the alumni who want an engineer at the head of the college, and who want to perpetuate the Brooks school of thought, if not perpetuate the Brooks regime, according to observers here. While Johnson is regarded as being eminently fitted for the post of Dean, and is conceded to have rendered great service to the State since he became a member of the faculty less than two years ago, there are a good many who feel he should not be made dean unless the board of trustees wants to perpetuate Dr. Brooks as the head of the school. For he is regarded as being something similar to the "air apparent" and the man Dr. Brooks would rather see made Dean than any other.

It is expected that the special committee named to select the administrative deans for State College and the Women's College in Greensboro will meet with President Frank Graham the latter part of this week or the first of next and that their selection will be announced before July 1, when the new deans are expected formally to take over the administration of these units of the university.
