

Natural nitrate of soda shipments from Chile are arriving on satisfactory schedule. Close to half a million tons are already here, delivered or ready for delivery. Another 200,000 tons are expected and every effort is being made to get it here in time for this season's crops.

If shipping estimates hold, there will be about as much Chilean nitrate for top and side dressing as last year. But because all of it is being distributed under the government's allocation program, it may be impossible to supply all sections in the same proportions as last year.

If you cannot get Chilean nitrate when you want it, remember the inconvenience is only temporary-one of many dislocations due to war.

Chilean nitrate is here in substantial quantity, but, like every good soldier, it goes where it is told and when it is told by the government.
