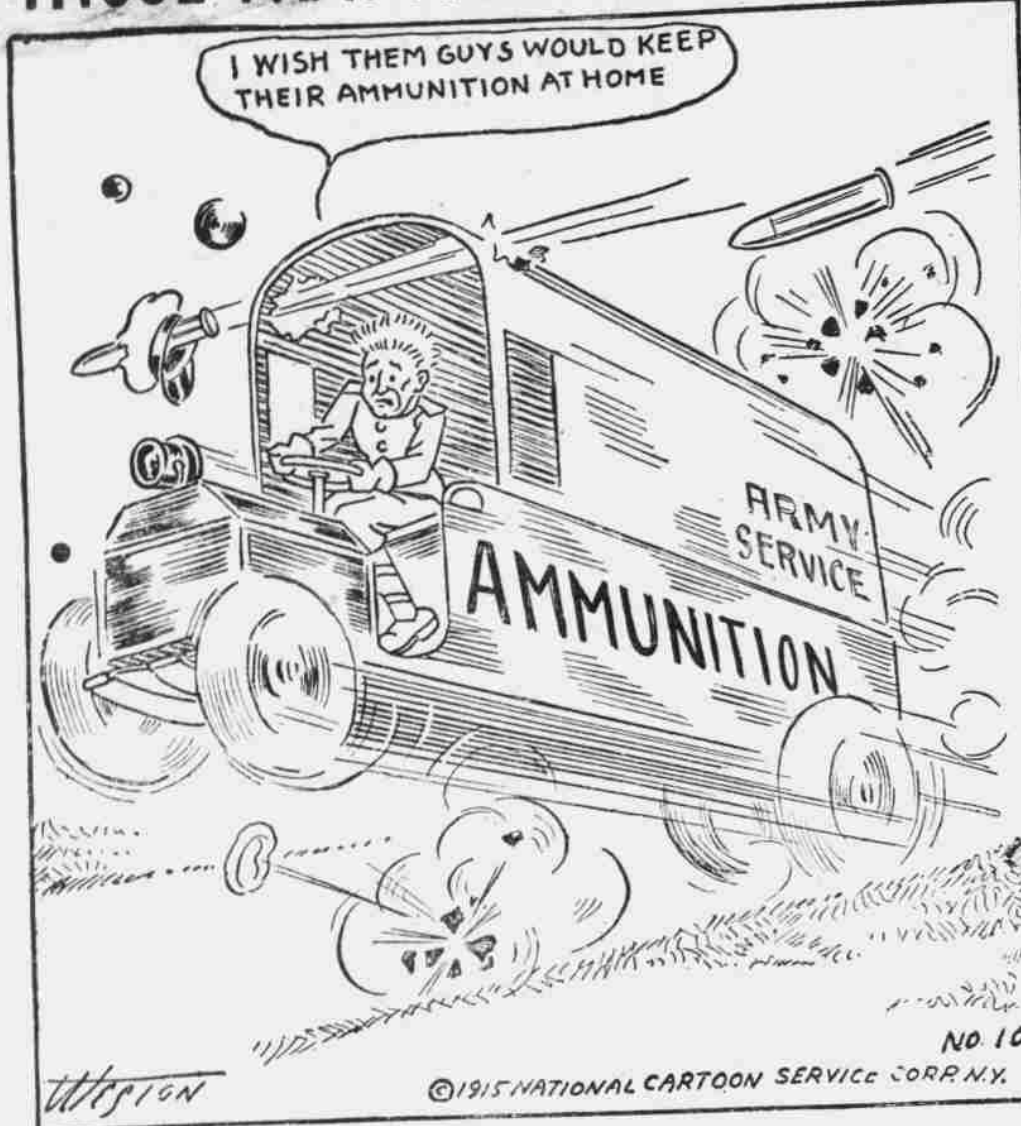

MANY AIR BATTLES ON WESTERN FRONT

(By Associated Press.)

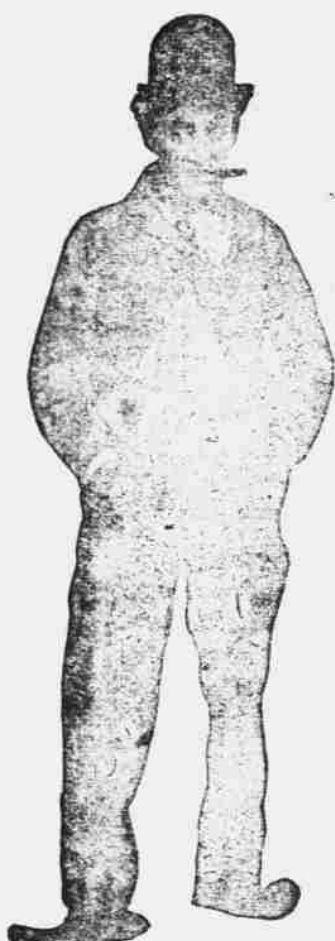
London, Nov. 29.—German air strategy has changed since last May, for a period of some months, few German aeroplanes appeared near the allied lines on the western front. But the latest report from Sir John French shows that more than 200 air battles have been fought recently with the British aviators, by whom sixteen German aeroplanes were brought down. These included several new types, besides the familiar Taube.

The new types the Germans have been experimenting with are modeled on the biplane idea. One of these was a big heavily armed biplane with twin bodies and two or three engines. But it did not seem to be entirely successful, as it was rather slow and unwieldy. Next to appear were two very similar biplanes of the ordinary type, but with a single but very powerful engine. The two used to swoop down the German lines at a terrific speed and with an unusual amount of noise, apparently to frighten away British airmen. Apparently they impressed the Germans as useful, and more of the same type made their appearance. Machine guns fore and aft, the range of the first limited by the propeller and the after gun having a clear field in an upward direction, gave a certain formidableness as scouts. Several of these were brought down by both British and French, but their numbers have nevertheless continued to increase of late. They keep largely to their own lines which seems to be the German plan of air strategy.

The German plan is obviously to destroy the greatest number of enemy aeroplanes with a minimum loss to themselves. They do this by enticing the foe over their own lines, as the airman not only has the support of high angle guns below but can land within his own territory in case of injury to himself or his machine.

AUSTRIAN SOLDIERS WILL NOT GET COLD

(By Associated Press.)

Vienna, Nov. 29.—Austrian soldiers will not suffer from cold weather if the army adopts the new electrically heated garments which have just been invented by the professor of electricity at Innsbruck University. The essential features of the Professor's invention, according to the Austrian newspapers, is a method of wearing electric heating threads into soldiers' pants and coats and then connecting the threads with a battery or supply wire at a distance of from 100 yards to a quarter of a mile. It is asserted that the current can be regulated so that any number of soldiers in the trenches can be kept warm simultaneously.

REPLY TO CRISIS

Administration's Answer to Charges of Cruelities in Mexico

Washington, Nov. 29.—The administration's reply to those who criticize the recognition of the Carranza government in Mexico because of charges of outrage upon priests and nuns of the Catholic church was made public last night in a letter by Secretary Tumulty to Dr. James J. McGuire of Trenton, N. J., who recently wrote to the white house asking for an explanation of what he characterized as "widespread criticism."

Secretary Tumulty advised Dr. McGuire that the files of the state department failed to disclose any official record of a single proven case of outrage upon nuns, and he included in his letter a statement by the Catholic vicar general at Mexico City, which while disclosing the shooting of priests, and the expulsion and imprisonment of others, declared there had been no violations of nuns in that district.

Secretary Tumulty said in all wars the horrors of the conflict have been kept alive by those on the losing side, but that it should be the duty of all citizens of the United States and Mexico to contribute in every manner to the early rehabilitation of the nation so long torn by civil strife and to avoid keeping open the wound.

"Counsel and sympathy are needful and would be meritorious now, because they would be of wonderful efficacy in uniting the people of Mexico in the work of reconstruction," wrote Mr. Tumulty. "Efforts to arouse rancorous feelings among them will have the effect of opening anew the wounds which should be healed, and of creating an open sore to torture that poor people as long as their minds are kept inflamed against their brethren."

The secretary also called attention to the recognition of President Juarez by the Buchanan administration following "the bloodiest of all civil wars ever waged in Mexico," marked by "all the bitterness cruelties of a religious war."

Emphasis was laid on the recognition of Carranza by the Latin-American countries which joined in the Pan American peace conferences. All of these Latin American countries, Mr. Tumulty pointed out, were Catholic nations.

Finally, a statement was reproduced which was given to the state department by Sincero Arredondo, U. S. Washington representative of General Carranza, last October, pleading the Carranza government to respect every body's "life, property and religious belief."

Secretary Tumulty inclosed in his message, a letter written by former Secretary Bryan last March to Rev. Francis G. Kelly of Chicago, giving in detail various steps taken by the United States government during the process of the revolution in Mexico to protect the representatives of all religious organizations in Mexico. It previously has been published.
